WANTS LARGE TRACT OF \$10 AN ACRE LAND

Has anyone in this section of eastern Oregon a tract of 100,000 acres of land they will sell at \$10 an acre. If so they may be able to find a buyer in Chicago. William McMurray, general passenger agent for the O. W. R. & N., is in receipt of a letter from W. G. Neimeyer, general agent in Chicago from which the following is an extract:

"A syndicate in Chicago is endeavoring to locate 100,000 acres of land in one tract. If possible, this can be purchased for less than \$10 per acre, which they propose to subdivide into 80-acre tracts, break up five acres of the land, build a house on same, furnish two horses and a wagon and one cow and then sell same on the installment plan."

LAND SHARK'S EASY PREY.

Worthless Land Sold for Improved Lots in Town. Milville, N. C.—Timber land two miles southwest of this city is being sold for "improved building lots" at fancy prices, according to a statement made by Receiver of Taxes Dooling who is being besieged by strangers and letters from all sections of the country inquiring the valuation of their properties. A Philadelphia speculator who came here this morning said that he recently purchased forty-three "building lots" on "South High street" from a Philadelphia realty company for \$11,350.

The man was almost overcome when told that the lots are in the woods between Milville and Dooling creek. He produced a map which contained about 1500 "lots." The supposed streets were named the same as those in the city, and pictures of the main city thoroughfares were on the outer cover. The investor told Dooling that he was assessed \$5 taxes for each lot and requested him to come here for the personal investigation.

"The whole plot of ground," said Dooling, "is assessed \$10.95." He said he has been informed that other investors had paid \$1 taxation to the company for each lot. A few days ago an investor from Canada came here to look over what he supposed to be lots in the center part of a thriving manufacturing city. He left on the next train swearing vengeance.

EXTORTION VICTIM, HE SAYS.

Sausalito Resident Tells Strange Story of Attack Made at Midnight. San Rafael, Calif.—E. M. Dates, fire commissioner of Sausalito and also one of the wealthiest residents of the place, told to the officials of this county a strange story of attempted extortion and a murderous assault. According to his story, he was called

up several times on the telephone by some unknown persons and told that he would have to put up \$200 or be "kissed up."

He says that he was called up twice in the evening but that whoever was doing the talking hung up before he could learn more.

About 11 o'clock he heard a noise in his barn and thinking that one of his \$1000 team of trotters had become ill in his stall, he went to the barn and was unlocking the door when three men assailed him.

One dealt him a terrific blow on the head. Dates, who is a large man, then commenced to fight and felled one of his assailants, after which they all ran away.

Dates is awaiting a hearing on a charge of assaulting Constable Cramer of Sausalito with a revolver and is now out on \$1000 bonds.

THRASHERS HUNGRY THIEF.

Woman Finding Him at Refrigerator Avoids Resources to Law. Danville, Pa.—With the price of foodstuffs soaring skyward, an epidemic of refrigerator robberies in Danville is considered as a matter of no small importance. Every morning one or more is reported.

When Mrs. Charles Smedley this morning unlocked the door opening on the back porch she was confronted by a man just arising from the examination of the contents of the refrigerator. The man ran up the Philadelphia & Reading tracks, with Mrs. Smedley in pursuit, and when she caught up with the thief she belabored him well.

While Mrs. Smedley recognized the thief, she will not prosecute him, deeming the thrashing she gave him as ample punishment.

LOUD EATER IS REBUKED.

Pennsylvania Justice Lectures Man on Table Department. Wilkes-Barre, Pa.—After making so much fuss while eating in a restaurant that he had started a quarrel with Walter Gordon of Duryean, was lectured severely by Alderman John F. Donohue of this city, and told to return home and learn better table manners.

"There are a great many fellows like you," said the alderman, "who come to this city and make themselves offensive to others by their lack of table manners in public places. They drink their coffee as if they were donkey pumps and eat their food with a noise like a concrete mixer at an asphalt plant.

NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVEMENT.

Notice is hereby given, that the Common Council did on October 25, 1911, pass the following resolution, and that the surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of the improvement as mentioned therein, to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land, is now on file in my office, said resolution being as follows: to-wit:

Whereas the city surveyor did on October 25, 1911, under direction of the Common Council, file plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement of Washington street from a point 100 feet east of the east line of Garfield street to the west line of Blaine street, Blaine street from the north line of Washington street to a point 200 feet north of the north line of Washington street, together with the estimates of the work to be done and the probable cost thereof, together with a statement of the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land to be benefited by such improvement, and percentage of the total cost of the improvement which each of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land should pay on account of the benefits to be derived therefrom; and Whereas the Common Council has examined such plans and specifications and found the same satisfactory and the estimates for the work to be done in accordance with the probable cost thereof; and

Whereas the property recommended by the city surveyor to be included within the boundaries of the district benefited is, in the judgment of the Common Council, properly to be included within such district, and no property is excluded therefrom which should properly be included therein; and

Whereas the improvement of the heretofore described portions of said streets by grading and constructing sidewalks and crosswalks along the north side of such portion of Washington street and the west side of such portion of Blaine street where there are at present no sidewalks or where the sidewalks are not constructed according to the ordinances of the City of Pendleton, the same is, in the judgment of the Common Council, at this time necessary; therefore,

Be It Resolved, by the Common Council of the City of Pendleton that it is expedient to improve and it is hereby proposed to improve Washington street, in the City of Pendleton, from a point 100 feet east of the east line of Garfield street to the west line of Blaine street, and Blaine street from the north line of Washington street to a point 200 feet north of the north line of Washington street, by making excavations and fills thereon and rolling the same with the city road roller, so as to make an even and compact surface upon the established grade of said streets and constructing sidewalks and crosswalks along the north side of such portion of Washington street and the west side of such portion of Blaine street where there are at present no sidewalks or where the sidewalks are not constructed according to the ordinances of the City of Pendleton, according to the plans and specifications therefore prepared by the city surveyor and filed with the recorder of the City of Pendleton on the 25th day of October, 1911; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the plans, specifications and estimates for such improvement, as so prepared by the city surveyor and so filed on the 25th day of October, be and they are hereby approved.

Be It Further Resolved, That the cost of making such improvement shall be a charge and lien upon all lots, parts of lots and parcels of land especially benefited by such improvement, proportionately as so benefited, and the owners of such lots, parts of lots and parcels of land so specially benefited shall be liable for the payment of the costs thereof in proportion as they are so specially benefited.

And Be It Further Resolved, That an assessment district is hereby created, embracing the property to be assessed for the payment of such improvement, which assessment district shall include the lots, parts of lots and parcels of land lying and being within the district bounded and described as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at the center of Block 4, Livermore's Addition to the City of Pendleton Oregon. Thence north along the center line of Blocks 4 and 5 in said addition to the center of Block 5. Thence west along the center line of Blocks 5, 2 and B in said addition to the southwest corner of Lot 3 of said Block B. Thence north 50 feet to the northwest corner of Lot 3 in said Block B. Thence west to the northwest corner of Lot 3 in Block 6, Cole's Addition to the City of Pendleton, Oregon. Thence south to the southwest corner of Lot 3, Block 12 of said Cole's Addition and Blocks C, 3 and 4 of said Livermore's Addition, to the place of beginning. And Be It Further Resolved, That a copy of this resolution, together with a notice that the surveyor's estimate of the proportion of the cost of said work to be charged against each lot, part of lot and parcel of land, is on file in the office of the City Recorder, be published for a period of ten days in the East Oregonian, which newspaper is hereby designated by the Common Council for the publication thereof.
