## TO AUDIT BOOKS OF WATER COMMISSION

### COUNCIL DECIDES AT REGULAR MEETING

Bill Against City Verified and Warrants Ordered Drawn for Same—New Councilman Takes Seat—Request Change in League Petition.

At the regular meeting of the council last night, it was decided that the books of the water commission should be audited when the Spokane experts, now busy experting the city books, complete their present task. The matter was suggested by Mayor Murphy and, there being no dissent from any of the councilmen, he ordered the work done.

Last night was bill night and as a result Recorder Fitz Gerald is today engaged in making out a large number of warrants. It became necessary at the session last night to change the description of considerable property on Cottonwood and Alta streets in the paving district inasmuch as the property, in question lies in South Pendleton instead of the original town. The error in the description was discovered by the recorder.

Councilman Montgomery, appointed to succeed his brother, T. G. Montgomery, took his seat last night and began his duties as a member of the governing body of Pendleton.

H. J. Slater appeared before the council last night to ask the council to consent to a typographical change in the commission government, peti-

tion filed recently. It was intended to correct a proof reading error but action by the council was deferred. The error is such that it will interfere in no way with the vote on the commission plan of government.

The others are for the extension of the boundaries of Meacham and Fulton districts westerly several miles to take in land not now in any district. J. R. Shockley of Meacham, J. F. Thompson and W. H.
