

### 10 AND 25 CENT ADVANCE ON CATTLE

GOOD RUN IN ALL  
LINES AT PORTLAND

Another Big Run of Mutton Marks  
Day at Stock Yard—Hogs Also  
Making a Good Showing—Wheat at  
Chicago Still Going Down.

(From Thursday's Journal.)  
There was a good run in all lines  
of livestock at North Portland and  
as a rule prices received were fa-  
vorable. Cattle were 10c up for cows  
and 25c for bulls.

The run of cattle is surprising, in-  
cluding 358 head for the 24 hours.  
The arrivals were about equally di-  
vided between this state and Idaho.  
The run of eight loads from Nampa  
was the feature of the day; the lot  
being sent in by one shipper.  
The late improvement in the cattle  
trade here has been forced for two  
reasons. One was that prices here  
were lower than in the country, there-  
fore making shipments to North Port-  
land impracticable and the other was  
the need of higher prices to induce  
supplies to come forward from Mont-  
ana. All of this in turn help the local  
shipper.

**Feeders for Interior.**  
The purchase of 140 head of feeder  
cattle by the Prineville Land & Live-  
stock company at North Portland dur-  
ing the past 24 hours, gives perhaps  
the best statement of the market.  
The purchase was made by the live-  
stock company for the purpose of  
stocking its ranch near Shaniko. The  
lot included steers and calves and was  
purchased at \$5. This is a lower price  
than the same stuff could have been  
purchased in the interior of Oregon.  
The shipment has been sent forward  
to eastern Oregon and later on will  
be returned to this market in a fin-  
ished condition.

At Chicago there was a strong tone  
in the cattle market with a run of  
but 6000 head.  
At South Omaha cattle were steady  
to strong with top steers \$7.15 and  
best cows and heifers \$5.30.

**Another Big Run of Mutton.**  
There was another big run of mutton  
today in the North Portland  
yards. Receipts were 3265 head,  
making the total thus far this week  
6134 head.  
Sheep trade continues with a firm  
tone in the local yards, and early  
trading indicated a continuance of the  
former high figures.

At Chicago there was a strong tone  
in the mutton trade, with a run of  
25,000 for the day.  
South Omaha sheep and lamb trade  
was steady with a run of 18,000 for  
the day. Top lambs sold there at \$6,  
yearlings \$4.25, wethers \$3.75 and  
ewes \$3.25.

**Hog Showing Good Again.**  
By noting the daily receipts of  
swine at North Portland it would be  
easy to figure the way the industry  
has increased here within the space  
of a year. Today's showing was 290  
head, making the totals for the week  
1251 head.

At Chicago there was a weaker tone  
in the swine trade, with prices 5c low-  
er. Tops sold at \$6.35.  
At South Omaha hogs were 5 to  
10c higher, with tops at \$6.20. This  
means \$6.30 to land here, therefore  
an advance is due in the North Port-  
land yards.

Foreign cables were still unfavorable  
although at the closing Liverpool was  
fractionally higher than Wednesday.

**STUDENTS AND FACULTY  
OPPOSE EXTRAVAGANCES**  
University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore.  
The management of the University  
of Oregon Men's Dormitory has re-  
duced the weekly rent of rooms from  
one dollar to fifty cents. This makes  
the cost of a room to a student,  
lighted, heated and tended, two dol-  
lars a month. This reduction in room  
rent is in accordance with the plan  
of President Campbell to reduce the  
living expenses of the students to a  
minimum.

Encouraged by President Campbell,  
the students themselves have passed  
a number of rules of government,  
tending to lessen the living expense  
and to do away with extravagances  
which tend to set a pace that the self-  
supporting students can not maintain.  
The students have ordained that no  
underclassmen shall wear derbies or  
stiff hats that no full dress suits  
shall not be worn by the freshmen on  
parties, and that evening dress attire  
shall not be worn by the freshmen on  
any occasion. The women of the uni-  
versity have gone further and refus-  
ed to allow their escorts to go to the  
expense of taking them to and from  
the parties in cabs or automobiles.

Another step towards the lowering  
of the student expense, which is be-  
ing contemplated by the student body  
is the granting of free admission to  
State of Ohio, City of Toledo, Lucas  
County.

**NOTICE OF STREET IMPROVE-  
MENT.**  
Notice is hereby given, that the  
Common Council did on October 25,  
1911, pass the following resolution,  
and that the surveyor's estimate of  
the proportion of the cost of the im-  
provement as mentioned therein, to be  
charged against each lot, part of  
lot and parcel of land, is now on file  
in my office, said resolution being as  
follows: to-wit:

Whereas the city surveyor did on  
October 25, 1911, under direction of  
the Common Council, file plans and  
specifications for an appropriate im-  
provement of Washington street from  
a point 100 feet east of the east line  
of Garfield street to the west line of  
Blaine street, Blaine street from the  
north line of Washington street to a  
point 200 feet north of the north line  
of Washington street, together with  
the estimates of the work to be done  
and the probable cost thereof, togeth-  
er with a statement of the lots, parts  
of lots and parcels of land to be ben-  
efited by such improvement, and per-  
centage of the total cost of the im-  
provement which each of such lots,  
parts of lots and parcels of land  
should pay on account of the benef-  
its to be derived therefrom; and  
Whereas the Common Council has  
examined such plans and specifica-  
tions and found the same satisfactory  
and the estimates for the work to be  
done in accordance with the probable  
cost thereof; and

Whereas, the property recommend-  
ed by the city surveyor to be includ-  
ed within the boundaries of the dis-  
trict benefited is, in the judgment of  
the Common Council, properly to be  
included within such district, and no  
property is excluded therefrom which  
should properly be included therein;  
and  
Whereas, the improvement of the  
hereinabove described portions of said  
streets by grading and constructing  
sidewalks and crosswalks along the  
north side of such portion of Wash-  
ington street and the west side of  
such portion of Blaine street where  
there are at present no sidewalks or  
where the sidewalks are not con-  
structed according to the ordinances  
of the City of Pendleton, is the same  
in the judgment of the Common Coun-  
cil, at this time necessary; therefore,  
Be It Resolved, by the Common  
Council of the City of Pendleton that  
it is expedient to improve and it is  
hereby proposed to improve Washing-  
ton street, in the City of Pendleton,  
from a point 100 feet east of the east  
line of Garfield street to the west line  
of Blaine street, and Blaine street  
from the north line of Washington  
street to a point 200 feet north of the  
north line of Washington street, by  
making excavations and fills thereon  
and rolling the same with the city  
road roller, so as to make an even  
and compact surface upon the estab-  
lished grade of said streets and con-  
structing sidewalks and crosswalks  
along the north side of such portion  
of Washington street and the west side  
of such portion of Blaine street where  
there are at present no sidewalks or  
where the sidewalks are not con-  
structed according to the ordinances  
of the City of Pendleton, according  
to the plans and specifications there-  
fore prepared by the city surveyor  
and filed with the recorder of the  
City of Pendleton on the 25th day of  
October, 1911; and

Be It Further Resolved, That the  
plans, specifications and estimates for  
such improvement, as so prepared by  
the city surveyor and so filed on the  
25th day of October, be and they are  
hereby approved.

Be It Further Resolved, That the  
cost of making such improvement  
shall be a charge and lien upon all  
lots, parts of lots and parcels of land  
especially benefited by such improve-  
ment, proportionately as so benefited,  
and the owners of such lots, parts of  
lots and parcels of land so specially  
benefited shall be liable for the pay-  
ment of the costs thereof in propor-  
tion as they are so specially benefi-  
ted.

And Be It Further Resolved, That  
an assessment district is hereby cre-  
ated, embracing the property to be  
assessed for the payment of such im-  
provement, which assessment district  
shall include the lots, parts of lots  
and parcels of land lying and being  
within the district bounded and de-  
scribed as follows, to-wit:

Commencing at the center of Block  
4, Livermore's Addition to the City of  
Pendleton Oregon. Thence north  
along the center line of Blocks 4 and  
5 in said addition to the center of  
Block 5. Thence west along the  
center line of Blocks 5, 2 and B in  
said addition to the southwest corner  
of Lot 3 of said Block B. Thence  
north 50 feet to the northwest corner  
of Lot 3 in said Block B. Thence  
west to the northwest corner of Lot 3  
in Block 6, Cole's Addition to the City  
of Pendleton, Oregon. Thence south  
to the southwest corner of Lot 3,  
Block 13 of said Cole's Addition.  
Thence east along the center line of  
said Block 13 of Cole's Addition an  
Block C, 3 and 4 of said Livermore's  
Addition, to the place of beginning.

And Be It Further Resolved, That  
a copy of this resolution, together  
with a notice that the surveyor's es-  
timate of the proportion of the cost  
of said work to be charged against  
each lot, part of lot and parcel of  
land, is on file in the office of the  
City Recorder, be published for a  
period of ten days in the East Ore-  
gonian, which newspaper is hereby  
designated by the Common Council  
for the publication thereof.
