U. S. MAY STOP LATIN OUTRAGE

Turkey Demands Interference in Tripoli in Name of Humanity.

ACTION UP TO PRESIDENT

Italy Finding Tripolitan Situation Too Hot, Would Welcome Chance to Withdraw With Honor—Will Relieve General Who Is Cowardly.

Washington, Nov. 6.—The question of United States interference in the Turkey-Italian war, to prevent further barbarities by the Italians, has been put up to President Taft, following Turkey's appeal to the American government for aid.

U. S. Sends Ship.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 6.—Bulletin—It was admitted here today that the United States cruiser had sailed from Malta for Tripoli, where it is alleged by the Turks that the Italians have been barbarous in their treatment of non-combatants, women and children, which Turkey asked the United States to end.

Italy Would Quit Tripoli.

Nice, France, Nov. 6.—Rome advices indicate that Italy would be glad to drop Tripoli if she could leave there without tarnishing the national honor. It is known the fresh reinforcements of 20,000 troops are being secretly assembled at Naples to support the Tripolitan army, which is practically besieged in Tripoli.

General Caneva takes too many precautions for his personal safety and it is reported he never went to the front during any battle, but remained hidden in a citadel.

Ship Goes Ashore.

WINDSTORM DAMAGES PENDLETON PROPERTY

Sends Physician's Auto on Guideless Run

Smashes Windows in Hotel and Private Residences and Lays Several Fences Low in City.

Pendleton was yesterday visited with the worst wind storm in many months and as a result many minor damages are reported from about the city. After a morning of intermittent showers, the storm swept down upon the city shortly after 1 o'clock and continued with unabated fury during the remainder of the afternoon and far into the night.

To such violence did it attain that the automobile belonging to Dr. I. U. Temple was carried backwards for a block along Main street, on to the curb of the sidewalk and stopped just before crashing into the plate glass window of the Wonder store.

Reports from other eastern Oregon and eastern Washington points indicate that the storm was general and, according to arrivals from Portland, it even reached as far west as that city.

HUNTS WITHOUT A LICENSE; FINED

MADERO IS INAUGURATED

One Thousand Troops Guard Him Enroute to Scene of Ceremonies.

PROMISES MEXICO PEACE

Orders, Feast for Twenty Thousand and Will Open Prison Doors and Allow All Political Prisoners to Leave Country for Other Parts.

Mexico City, Nov. 6.—Lavish pomp, splendor bordering upon the barbaric and all the show of which the Mexicans are capable of making, today temporarily venerated the internal dissensions of the republic of Mexico when Francisco Madero—conqueror of former President Porfirio Diaz, against whom he led a successful rebellion, was inaugurated as chief executive of the republic in this city.

In an address which he delivered for the first time as president of the nation, Madero told his twenty thousand listeners that he would promise them a reign of peace for at least three months and was wildly cheered that he would eventually make the entire country permanently peaceful.

With the conclusion of his address, brass bands started playing the national anthem and the vast horde of people gathered, joined in singing after which the crowd made its way to a place where a big tree banquet was served, under orders of the new chief.

Tonight a huge inaugural ball will be given in the governor's palace and a reception tendered the new president Provisional President De la Barra, leaves tonight for an extended tour of Europe and a demonstration will be accorded him by the public, with whom he is exceptionally popular.

It is expected that one of the first acts of President Madero will be the liberation of all political prisoners now confined in various Mexican prisons on condition that they will immediately leave Mexico.

Many of these prisoners are royalists, whose recent demonstrations for General Reyes were too enthusiastic for the new chief.

General Gomez is now an exile in San Antonio, Texas, and with the departure of those now in prison, Madero believes that he will be rid of his most dangerous political enemies.

AIRMAN ENDS FLIGHT ACROSS CONTINENT

Rodgers Reaches Pasadena California

Official Ending of Great Aerial Achievement Postponed—Escapes Lionizing Horde of Women Admirers.

Pasadena, Calif., Nov. 6.—Aviator Rodgers last night having practically completed his aeroplane flight from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast, on his arrival here, this morning showed the signs of his strenuous trip across the continent through the air, when he slept soundly until a late hour, for the first time since leaving the eastern coast.

This morning he tested out his machine, but as yet has not leeked what ocean town he will select for the official ending of the first transcontinental flight ever made.

CHINESE CONTROL CAPTURED BY REVOLUTIONARY FORCES

Imperial Army Submits to Rebel Invasion After Twelve Hour Almost Bloodless Battle

MANCHU PRINCES SEEK SAFETY BY FLEEING CITY

Former Imperial Diplomat Accepts Secretaryship of New Republic--All Nations Advised to Send Troops to Protect Interests in Peking.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 6.—Cable advices received here today from China, states that the Chinese revolutionists succeeded in capturing Peking, the capital of the Chinese empire, yesterday following a battle which lasted twelve hours.

According to the report, much fighting between the rebels and imperial troops occurred in the streets of the city, but the bloodshed was not as great as it was feared would be the case with the attack on the city.

It is believed that the resistance against the invasion was not very enthusiastic. The Manchu princes made their escape by fleeing from the city.

Reports Confirmed.

Vancouver, Nov. 6.—Other cablegrams from Hongkong and Shanghai practically confirm the fall of Peking. They say the emperor escaped.

No News at Washington.

Washington, Nov. 6.—No Peking dispatches have been received here today and it is known therefore whether the capital has fallen.

Fang Is Secretary.

Shanghai, Nov. 6.—Permanence and stability for the new Chinese provisional government, as proposed by General Li Yuan Hong recently proclaimed president of the Chinese republic, is indicated today with the announcement that Wu Ting Fang, former Chinese minister to the United States, has accepted the post of foreign secretary under the new regime.

Admiral Winslow, Commanding the British Naval Forces, today advised England to send more troops to China as he fears grave disorders will accompany the Manchu overthrow.

It is understood he suggested that the other countries interested send fifteen hundred soldiers, each, immediately.

The crews of three of Admiral Sals' gunboats today placed their boats at the rebels' disposal here.

The remainder of the fleet is expected soon to fall into the rebels' hands, as the vessels are almost out of ammunition, with no prospects of getting more.

MAN WHO FLEECED LOCAL MAN CAUGHT

A. A. West, Alias Campbell, Mayberry Gang Member, to be Returned to Oregon.

San Jose, Calif., Nov. 6.—A. A. West, the man who under the name of Campbell operated with the notorious Mayberry gang of swindlers and fleeced Charles Cunningham, the Pendleton sheep king, out of several thousand dollars on a fixed wrestling bout has been positively identified here and preparations are being made to turn him over to the Portland police, who have been searching for him for some time. He was arrested here some time ago on a charge of selling land in Mexico which he did not own and was recently identified as the much sought for man who broke his parole in Oregon six years ago and fled.

Shortly after he had fleeced the Pendleton sheepman out of a large sum he was taken up and identified by Cunningham as the man who had engineered the swindle, but owing to pressure brought to bear and to the fear of notoriety, he declined to prosecute the case.

West, alias Campbell, however, was out on a parole, having been sentenced to serve three years for forgery.
