WOMAN RECOGNIZES LOST SON IN WAYFAREK

Eugene, Ore., Nov. 7.—Mrs. C. E. Leiberg, living 50 miles up the Mackenzie river from this city, claims to have recognized, in a logger who came that way and asked his way to a sawmill, her lost son, but who has thus far been unable to recall any part of his past life. He gives his name as George Lewis, and says he is a logger, while Mrs. Leiberg, who is a practicing physician, claims that he is her son, by a former marriage, a civil engineer and graduate of the University of California. The young man appeared at the home of Mrs. Leiberg, and when the woman, who is a physician, claimed him as her son he could not recall her or anything of his past life. Mrs. Leiberg believes the young man's story that he has been the victim of an assault, and that the blow on his head has caused a lapse of memory. The young man is now in this city under observation of some of the leading physicians, while Mrs. Leiberg is in Hillsboro investigating the story of the assault.

New York, Nov. 7.—Today's election for assemblymen and county and other minor offices has been preceded by a warm campaign in which the Republican-Independence League fusionists have made numerous bitter attacks on the Tammany Hall nominees. William Randolph Hearst has led the fusionist forces in their campaign against the Murphy regime.

Avon, Mass., Nov. 7.—(Bulletin.)—Governor Foss carried the town by a vote of 175 to Forthingham's 135.

Cleveland, O., Nov. 7.—The test of progressive strength comes today in the election of non-partisan delegates to the constitutional convention to be held in January. Supporters of the progressive constitution hope to elect a majority of delegates pledged to the initiative, referendum and recall. The re-election of Mayor Whitlock is predicted and Newton Baker, a demagogue as Cleveland's mayor.

MAINE WILL STAY ON THE WATER WAGON

Augusta, Maine, Nov. 7.—Maine retains constitutional prohibition. Governor Plaisted and his council decided last night to accept the corrections in the vote of four towns, cast in the special election in September, thus reversing the result as indicated on the face of the first official returns.

Returns on the election of September 11, indicated a majority of about 200 against the repeal of the prohibitory amendment but the later official count showed a majority of twenty-six against the repeal.
