## FIRE LADDIES TO SELECT OFFICERS

ELECTION TO BE HELD IN CITY DECEMBER 4

Rescue Hook and Ladder Company Gives a Banquet and Nominates A. J. Gibson for Chief of City Department to Succeed John Vaughan.

Monday, December 4, will be the date of another election besides that which will determine city officers and issues that day being the official one for the selection of officers of the fire department and of the different fire companies. Only members in good standing will be allowed to cast a ballot.

The initial move in the campaign for this election was made last night at a meeting and banquet of the Rescue Hook and Ladder company, No. 1, when a complete ticket for the officers of the department and its own organization was nominated. A. J. Gibson was put into the field to capture the mantle of fire chief now worn by John Vaughan, and William Bogart and John Dyer were named to make the race for first and second assistants.

The other companies have not yet made their nominations, but it is expected that Vaughan, who has been chief of the department for many years, will again be put up as a candidate to succeed himself.

Officers for No. 1. The following members last night were nominated for officers of the hook and ladder company: For president, Pat McDevitt; for secretary, Jack Webster; for treasurer, Frank O'Gara; for foreman, Ed Hemmelgarn; for first assistant, Ed Sticker; for second assistant, J. W. McGee.

The banquet was held in the basement of the city hall and was attended by members and a few invited guests.
