ENGLAND WILL FINANCE NEW NAVY FOR PORTUGAL

Loan is Offered for Construction of Ships, Provided the Vessels Are Constructed in Yards in Great Britain.

Lisbon, Portugal (via frontier).—The British Minister at Lisbon, in a conference with the Minister of Marine, pointed out that, as Portugal was an ally of Great Britain, she must reorganize her navy. Accordingly, the government has decided to purchase several warships and certain artillery.

A proposal has been received from British capitalists for a loan of \$50,000,000 to run twenty-five years at 4 per cent, conditional, however, on an agreement that the proposed warships shall be built in England.

The government, nevertheless, will invite bids from French and German contractors.
