UMATILLA BECOMING DISTRIBUTING POINT

RIVER DOCKAGE RIGHTS ARE MUCH IN DEMAND

Portland Shippers Are Showing Interest in Umatilla County's Seaport City—New Ladies' Aid Starts Movement for Protestant Church.

Umatilla, Ore., Nov. 11.—Umatilla is evidently destined to be a distributing point of some consequence and is being recognized as such by the wholesale interests of Portland. Immense shipments of freight are transferred at this point. Local interests are preparing to handle these shipments. Monday evening another application for river frontage was made by Russell Brownell of Hermiston and Guy R. Moss of this city. The city fathers took the matter under advisement and will report at an early date. This firm asked for a lease of twenty years and will, if they secure their lease, put up a dock immediately.
