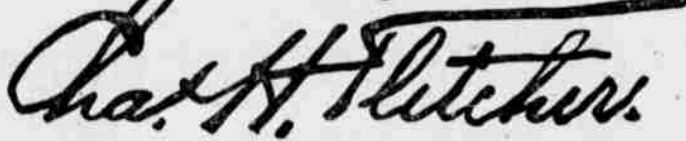

General Sherman's Orderly Reads From Proverbs, but Judge Sends Him to Jail.

Los Angeles.—Although he quoted from the old Bible his mother gave him 60 years ago as authority for his right to drink deeply when troubled, John Allen, orderly to General Sherman on the march through Georgia, is in jail, starting a 50 days' sentence for intoxication.

When arraigned before Police Judge Rose Allen freely admitted that he had drunk to excess, justifying himself with this passage from the 31st chapter of Proverbs:

"Give strong drink unto him that is ready to perish and wine unto those that be of heavy hearts. Let him drink and forget his poverty and remember his misery no more."

"I am often heavy-hearted," said Allen, "and keep a jug of wine handy for those periods."
