# CATTLE MARKET IS OVERFLOWING

### ALL PORTLAND KILLERS FILLED AND MORE COMING

#### Price Shows Decline of Ten Cents—Mutton Situation Remains Firm With Only Nominal Receipts—Chicago Wheat is Dull.

(From Tuesday's Journal.) Everyone is filled with cattle and receipts continue to pile into the North Portland yards. While this morning's run was but 281 head, there are liberal supplies en route to this city and packers already have about all the stuff they can take care of at nearby feed lots.

Quite a large amount of stuff is coming forward from Montana and Wyoming points and as soon as the market becomes better there will be liberal offerings from Utah.

Quite a few of the local feeders are beginning to market their cattle and taken together, the supplies available at this time are fully double the requirements of the trade.

Sales of cattle in the yards this morning were reported at a decline of about a dime from yesterday. Trading started slow and some of the stuff that was carried over from yesterday did not meet with any liberal call this morning.

**Sheep Market Remains Firm.**  
At the advance quoted in the North Portland yards during the past few days the mutton trade was firm today. The run was small, consisting of but 275 head and these were brought forward by Hunt & Lacey, a commission firm.

Packers continue to bid high prices for sheep and lambs, owing to the smaller run recently. Their wants now must be supplied by weekly shipments from the interior, therefore the demand is making the market firm day to day.

**Hog Market Remains Weak.**  
While there were not enough hogs in the swine market today to give the trade a full test of prices, the outlook at North Portland is less favorable for high values than for some time. The total run for the day was but 54 head, these being brought forward with cows and calves from Arlington by C. C. Clark & Son, the local butchers.

There was another reversal of sentiment on the swine trade at Missouri river points during the past 24 hours. While recently showing great strength, the market there today was extremely weak although the run was only 6200 head. Prices dropped 10c under yesterday with tops at \$6.40. This means \$1.50 to land at Pacific coast packing houses.

At Chicago there was a run of 31,000 hogs today compared with 23,000 a year ago. The market was weaker and prices closed 5c lower than yesterday with tops at \$6.60. Both mixed and good heavy stuff brought the higher figures there today.

**Chicago Wheat is Waiting.**  
Chicago, Nov. 15.—Wheat trade was again in a waiting attitude and the closing was unchanged for the December and 1-8c lower for each the May and July.

Market started 1-8 to 3-8c off for the December and May and unchanged for the July. Opening was influenced by the lower prices at European centers and the more favorable tone of the Argentine situation.

# CALLS \$82.26 A YEAR ENOUGH TO LIVE ON

### Chicago Man Has Plan Which Would Knock Out Mr. High Cost-of-Living.

Chicago.—What does it cost you to live a year?  
A Chicago man says he can live on \$82.26 a year. That is \$1.58 1-5 a week, or 22 4-7 cents a day.

Seth Farnsworth is the man who declares he has evolved the process. He calls his plan the "clearing house co-operative system."

Farnsworth was connected with the World's Fair Demolition Contractors in 1893, when the men were boarded at from 80 cents to \$1.20 a week each. He points to the achievement of several educational institutions that board students for from \$1.20 to \$1.75 a week. This is accomplished through full-co-operation, he says, as opposed to the English profit sharing plan.

"The trouble with the profit-sharing plan is that it does not reduce the cost to the consumer sufficiently," he observed. "In the New York plan a reduction of only 10 per cent is promised, when it should be 80 per cent."

"Not long ago an Ohio farmer sold his tomatoes to a canning concern at 10 cents a bushel. At that rate, a can of tomatoes that retails for 15 cents costs the factory about 3 cents, can, labor and all.

"Shouldn't it be possible to get it to the consumer at greatly less than 10 per cent under the regular retail price?"

"Cooperative clearing houses should be established in every center. There should be no money passed—that would ruin the scheme. At first it might work a hardship on retailers, but in the end it would be to the great benefit of all."
