#### "THE MEANEST THING IN PENDLETON" TONIGHT

Evangelist Holmes Delighted With Progress of Christian Church Revival.

"The Meanest Thing in Pendleton" is the subject announced for tonight at the Christian church by Evangelist Holmes. Quite a good deal of speculating has been indulged in concerning the matter, but no one but the evangelist seems to know just what line he is going to follow, but something out of the ordinary may be expected.

When asked of the prospects for the revival, the evangelist expressed great satisfaction with the results thus far obtained, not only in the number that have united with the church, but with the steady growth in the attendance, which reached its best in Sunday night's audience which crowded the main auditorium. He said that he had heard so much about Pendleton being such a hard place, but thought after all it was not different from most fields, and that straight forward preaching, in which the gospel was proclaimed in kindness, would yield the same results here as elsewhere.

Asked about the town, Mr. Holmes said: "I think Pendleton has a good future. In fact, all these western towns are bound to grow, and rapidly too. Of course there has been a depression in business everywhere for the last year or two, and the west has felt it, but things are brightening up and we may expect a prosperous era again and Pendleton will come in for her share. There are improvements to be made here as elsewhere. Especial attention should be called to the water. Water taken direct from the river is bound to bring bad results. No wiser investment for the city could be made than that of tapping a mountain stream and giving the city pure water. I am interested in all that concerns the city, and may have more to say along this line later. Just now, this revival demands all my time, but it is going to succeed."
