R. R. COMMISSION ASSISTS IMMIGRANTS

Salem, Ore., Nov. 21.—That the state railway commission, enables hundreds of poor people to obtain justice in instances where they could not without the intervention of the commission, is the claim of J. H. Walker, of Salem, who gives his own story to illustrate this contention.

Walker came from Sedalla, Mo., to Salem a year ago this month. Through an error made by an agent of the Missouri Pacific railway company, the proper notes in regard to the payment of freight on Walker's household goods were omitted.

When he arrived at Salem, Walker found that he had to pay an additional \$9.37 in order to get his freight, although he had prepaid it. He took the matter up with the state railway commission and the commission in turn took it up with the companies. By February a signed statement was obtained admitting the overcharge, but it was not until today that Walker was enabled to get his money back. Early this month he went again, nine months after the overcharge had been acknowledged, but was told by the company that he had to pay \$3 in addition to what he had already overpaid.

This is no exceptional case, according to the rate clerk of the commission, but he declares there are hundreds of similar examples. In one instance there was an overcharge of \$100 and it took the man almost a year to get it refunded. He accounts for this treatment of immigrants, which seems inconsistent with the

avowed policy of the company to encourage westward travel, by the fact that the subordinate officials of the railroad companies are held strictly to account for collecting all charges and if they are in doubt they overcharge to make sure of getting enough. Then the overcharge becomes involved in the general railroad machine and can not be gotten by an individual.

NOW BANISHED FOR CRIME.

Incorrigible Youth Sent Out of the Country for Ten Years for Theft.

Oakland, Cal.—Banishment from American soil for ten years in the effect of a plan for the probation of John Owens, to which Superior Judge Biedsoe agreed. Owens will sail on a ship leaving San Francisco within a few days, and if he returns to America within the time set he will be liable to a ten years' term in prison.

The proposition to banish Owens was suggested by representatives of the Welsh Society of San Francisco, who desire Owens to return to Wales to the care of his family.

He pleaded guilty to a grand larceny charge originally, and when his probation was revoked was committed to the reformatory at Preston and feigned insanity after his release.

Contractor Stabs Rival.

Sheridan, Ore.—E. Bowers and William Cranford, rival contractors, engaged in a street fight here in which Bowers was severely cut with a large jack-knife in the back of the neck. The men quarreled and separated. Cranford soon returned with an open knife and called Bowers a vile name. Bowers struck him a severe blow and in turn received the cuts, which are not regarded serious. No arrests have been made so far.
