### LITTLE DOG STOPS A TEAM OF RUNAWAYS

Chicago, Ill.—Leaping to the horse's head and catching the bridle in her teeth, a little yellow bulldog stopped the mad dash of a runaway in North Clark street. It was only after a dozen attempts that the dog, having kept pace with the horse, caught the bridle.

"Queen" is the name of the canine heroine, a thoroughbred animal, owned by Harry W. Gammon, manager of the Gammon Express and Van company, 1434 North Clark street, and the special pet of the office stenographer, Mollie Levy, 16 years old.

The runaway dashed by the office with the remnant of a buggy from which the driver had been thrown by a collision with a street car. Gammon gave chase. Queen dashed ahead and soon was at the side of the runaway, making desperate leaps for the bridle. When the dog obtained a grip it held on, swinging violently, until the horse stopped and Gammon released it, turning the runaway over to a policeman.

Queen stood looking a minute or so at the horse, as if to see if everything was all right, and then, dodging through the legs of an admiring throng, dashed back to the warmth in the Gammon office, where Miss Levy was waiting.

### WOMAN JURY ILLEGAL, SAYS U. S. ATTORNEY

### Law Says "Twelve Male Persons" is Contention, Recent Trials Should Not Stand.

Los Angeles.—Many high court decisions, holding that common law juries consisted of twelve male persons, bar women from serving on juries, in the opinion of George Cryer, assistant United States Attorney of this district. In consequence, Cryer believes that the trials in which

women have served as jurors in different parts of California since the adoption of the suffrage amendment to the state constitution, were illegal. But since in every case verdicts of not guilty were returned by the women juries, no action is expected to be taken.

"In my opinion women are not qualified to act as jurors in this or any other state, unless the constitution of the state is specifically amended so to provide," says Cryer.

"The recently adopted amendment gives women of this state the right to vote, but not to serve as jurors. The constitution of this state and the national constitution provides that persons charged with crime may demand a trial by a common law jury, designated as twelve men."

## PROGRESSIVE LEAGUE MEETS TOMORROW

For the purpose of taking further steps in the campaign for the adoption of the commission form of government in Pendleton a meeting of the Progressive Non-partisan Municipal League will be held at the city hall tomorrow, Thursday, evening. A call to this effect was made by the chairman of the league today and all members who can attend the gathering tomorrow night are requested to do so. The session will be held in the assembly room opposite the public library and will begin at 7:30.

At this time there are nearly 300 members in the Progressive League and it is the intention of the league to carry on more or less of an educational campaign between now and December 4 so as to make the public thoroughly informed as to the meaning and merits of the commission plan.

### STREETS PAVED WITH GOLD.

### California City Finds It Is Using Gold Bearing Quartz for Paving.

Pasadena.—California street, next to Fair Oaks avenue, the longest street in Pasadena, is being paved with gold. At least gold-bearing crushed rock is being used as the foundation upon which bitulithic will later be laid. Two veteran prospectors, James Hornaday and James Capton, both of this city, are authority for the declaration that the crushed stone being used in the paving work is gold laden. They discovered the fact while standing at the corner of Fair Oaks avenue and California street. Of a dozen pieces of rock picked up in the street more than half bore evidences of gold ore in paying quantities. Andrew Holloway, who holds the paving contract for California street, says the rock comes from the San Dimas quarries which have supplied thousands of tons of it for street and road improvement work in various parts of southern California.

### HAIR SNIPPER GETS AWAY.

### Pursued by Angry Women, He Jumps From Train After Arrest.

San Bernardino, Calif.—Urged on by angry Arizona women whose locks were shorn, officers are searching for P. J. Shelten, an alleged "hair snipper" who escaped from policemen by jumping off a train near Needles.

Shelten was arrested near Flagstaff. According to the police he mistook a "rat" for real hair and his shears became caught in the wiry meshes of a woman's artificial hair.

This delayed him long enough to fall into the hands of the woman's escort, who turned him over to policemen. Shortly afterwards the man regained his liberty by leaping off a speeding train while being taken to jail.
