### NEW LIVERY BARN OPENS AT ECHO

RESERVOIR BEING FILLED BY UMATILLA FLOOD WATER

ollowing Lengthy Controversy, Land Owner Quit Claims Deed Strip to County for Road and Highway is Being Improved.

(Special Correspondence.) Echo, Ore., Nov. 25-Another new ousiness was added to Echo when J. . Gulliford yesterday opened his new livery stable on the corner of Buckley and Dale streets. This stable is well equipped with comfortable conveyances and good horses.

Owing to the recent rise in the Umatilla river, water has been turned into the government canal for the purpose of filling the reservoir nine miles north of Echo. As the canal has been dry since last June the govcrnment pond is quite low and it will take several months to refill it to its full capacity.

A force of men and teams, employed by the county are at work on the road just south of town and west of the R R track. This is a new road over which there has been considerable controversy but lately the owners of the land quit claimed the strip occupied by the road to the county. That portion of the road inside the city limits will be put in shape by the city.
