MEADOW FARMERS PASS RESOLUTIONS

ASKING GOVERNMENT TO BUILD JOHN DAY PROJECT

Copies Sent to President, Secretary of the Interior, Oregon Congressional Delegation, Oregon Development League and Commercial Bodies.

(Special Correspondence.) Stanfield, Ore., Nov. 28.—Strong resolutions were adopted by the farmers living on the "Meadows" adjacent to the Umatilla river at a meeting which was held at the home of Zoeth Houser Saturday evening. Copies have been sent to President Taft, the secretary of the interior, senators from Oregon, representatives in congress from Oregon, the Oregon Development League, and to various Commercial bodies. The resolutions follow:

Whereas, some 200,000 to 300,000 acres of fertile soil in Gilliam, Morrow and Umatilla counties, in the state of Oregon, which are now unproductive because of insufficient precipitation of moisture, might be made highly productive and capable of supporting 10,000 to 20,000 families by the construction of what is known as the John Day project in Oregon; and

Whereas, the department of the interior has pronounced the said John Day project both feasible and desirable; and

Whereas, Oregon has contributed largely to the reclamation funds and has not received through expenditure within the state the amount of reclamation funds which she justly deserves; and

Whereas, the irrigation of the lands of the West Umatilla extension, by means of flood water from the Umatilla river, according to present plans of the United States reclamation service would unjustly deprive old settlers and small farmers along the Umatilla river and all its tributary streams above Stanfield, of water which they need and desire for the irrigation of their lands; and

Whereas, there is doubt as to the sufficiency of all the waters available from the Umatilla river and its tributaries, after the rights of all prior appropriators have been complied with, to irrigate efficiently the sandy lands nearer the Columbia river, of which the West Umatilla extension is comprised; and

Whereas, the continued consideration of the West Umatilla extension is retarding development of some 10,000 acres of land for which irrigation has already been provided, and hindering and preventing investment of capital in further improvement of lands already under cultivation; and

Whereas, even needed roads and highway improvement by the county court has been refused because of the existing uncertainty that such roads or highway improvement, for which expenditures might otherwise be

UMATILLA COUNTY GIRL DIES IN INDIA

Friends of Mrs. Charles Rutherford, formerly Miss Gertrude Preston will be shocked to learn of her untimely death which occurred on October 13th, 1911, at the American Baptist Mission in India, where her husband was stationed as missionary pastor. Eleven days after the birth of her child, Dorothy Janet, she was seized with a deadly attack of malarial fever to which she succumbed after a three days' struggle.

Native Christians at their own request bore her remains on their shoulders a distance of more than a mile to the last resting place, where according to the laws of that country, she was buried within twenty-four hours of death. The casket was placed under ground in a cement receptacle and covered with solid masonry. The distressing news reached her parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Preston, at Huntington Beach, Calif., in a letter from the stricken husband which was received November 17.

This is a sad blow for the parents, both of whom are in very poor health. Gertrude was last seen by her parents and friends in this country in the summer of 1907, when she left the United States for a seven years' stay in the foreign field. She was nearing her thirty-first birthday, being the oldest of a family of nine children, the youngest also having died some years ago.

She was graduated from the E. O. S. N. S. in 1901 and from McMinnville College in 1906.

Mrs. J. N. Scott of Athena, with Mr. Scott and little daughter, arrived at Huntington Beach just two days after the news of Gertrude's death.—Western Leader.

Jesus demanded that "no" should be the answer to all temptations to do wrong—one must deny the flesh, "self," and follow Him in the course of good. It was a somewhat new line of thought, but the audience greatly appreciated the effort.

All rejoiced in hearing "The Good Confession" at the close. Some will be baptized again on Wednesday night. One remarkable feature of this meeting is the number of men that have been won for Christ. Others are deeply concerned and it is thought by the workers that the "real harvest" is yet to come. "Selling Out" will be the subject of the sermon for tonight.
