FIVE MINERS FOUND ALIVE IN TENN. MINE

Bryceville, Tenn., Dec. 12 .- With the probability that from twenty-five to thirty of the 150 miners entombed are still alive, rescue efforts today are redoubled. Five men were recovered alive last night. Seven more bodies were found this morning, making the total of the recovered dead thirty. Far back in the mine, faint tapings indicate that some of the other miners are alive. The rescuers are
