DR. C. J. SMITH HEADS BOARD OF HEALTH

LOCAL PHYSICIAN HONORED AT STATE CAPITAL MEETING

Board Plans to Supply All Towns in Willamette Valley With Pure Water from Clear Lake—War on Walla Walla.

Dr. C. J. Smith of this city has been honored by being chosen as president of the state board of health, which has just completed its annual meeting at Salem. Dr. Alfred Kinney of Astoria, was chosen vice president and Dr. Calvin S. White of Portland as secretary.

Dr. Smith arrived home from the meeting this morning and reports a very profitable session of the board. The principal matter of importance discussed was a plan for furnishing all of the cities of the Willamette valley from Eugene and Springfield to Salem and all of the state institutions between those points with the pure, cold waters of Clear Lake.

The proposition was suggested by Dr. Calvin S. White and met with such unanimous approval that Engineer L. C. Kelsey, the same hydraulic engineer who made the survey for the Pendleton mountain water line, was authorized to survey the project, to submit the subject to the cities and towns which would be users of the water and to pave the way for the consummation of the project in other ways.

Lake Water Very Pure.
Clear Lake is a body of water two miles long, three quarters of a mile wide and of great depth up the McKenzie river near the summit of the Cascade mountains. It is fed by the glaciers of the Three Sisters and by the snows and ice beds of other portions of the Cascades, and, it is argued, its waters could not possibly be contaminated. The water is icy in its coldness and of wonderful clearness.

No estimate of the cost of such a project has been made and it has not yet been determined what engineering problems would have to be solved. However, so great is the need of the Willamette valley cities and the state institutions for pure water that if it is considered feasible, the plan will be submitted to the next legislature.

After Walla Walla.
Among other matters considered by the board at its session was the pollution of the waters of the Walla Walla and an effort will be made to restrain the city from so doing.
