INDIANS WIRE OF NEW BROTHERHOOD

ASK THAT UMATILLA INDIANS ERECT LARGE NEW TEEPEE

Charlie Van Pelt, Charging Chiefs Unsupine and No Shirt With Selfishly Hoarding Their Money, Asks for Aid in Making Homeward Trip.

Asking that his people on the local reservation prepare a long teepee so that he and his fellow delegates may tell them of the great brotherhood of redmen which has just been organized at Washington, D. C., Chief No. 81 of the Umatillas last night sent a short letter to Major Lee Moorhouse. The convention closes this week and the six Indians who represented the three tribes on the Umatilla reservation will return to their homes immediately.

Following is the chief's letter in full: "Brotherhood completely organized, great work done, will pass resolution today against whiskey. Will meet commissioner tomorrow. Have met president. Tell our people to prepare a long teepee so we can explain when we come home. Give telegram to my people and tell my wife. Another telegram soon."

Major Moorhouse also received a telegram from Charlie Van Pelt, one of the other delegates, and his message indicates that the forming of the brotherhood is of secondary importance to his own particular needs. He declares Chiefs Unsupine and No Shirt refuse to give him any funds and wants Gilbert Muthorn to telegraph him money at once in order that his expenses on the return trip can be met.

SWALLOWS BOGUS MONEY.

Prisoner's Act Does Not Save Him: Gets Three Years.

Salt Lake City.—The fact that he had swallowed the only prima facie evidence against him did not save Walter Watson, charged with attempting to pass a \$2 bill, which had been raised to \$10, from prison. Federal Judge Marshall sentenced him to three and a half years at Leavenworth. Watson attempted to pass the bill on a local merchant. He was seized by the merchant, but succeeded in swallowing the bill.

GAME WARDEN CONTROLS PEARLS IN TEXAS LAKE

Houston, Texas.—Pearls of great purity and of good market value have been found in clams which abound in Caddo lake in Marion county, Texas. The finds were made by a camping party enjoying a clam bake, one of the clams yielding a pearl appraised by local jewelers to be worth over \$1000.

Announcement of the find precipitated a rush of amateur pearl hunters and the number of clams that inhabited the lake was greatly reduced. So extensive did the search become that the state game, fish and oyster department announced jurisdiction over the "pearl industry" and pearl hunting was stopped.

The pearl hunters question the authority of the state game warden over the search and a test case is to be made, which if decided against the state, will let down the bars for the opening of a new industry in Texas.

While in the hospital he underwent two operations, one for the removal of two cysts from his eyelid and one for the removal of a cataract from his eye. Both were successful and as a result Mr. Sharon's sight is much improved. Another cataract is forming on his other eye, however, and within two years he will be compelled to undergo another operation.

Postal Rush is On.

For days past the postal people have been kept busy handling packages that go far while Mr. Brown and his assistant, Harry Ross, devote their time to registering packages and letters.
