CHRISTMAS FOR ROYALTY. Distribution of Gifts as Usual, Notwithstanding Royal Family's Absence.

London.—While the King and Queen are discharging imperial duties in the golden East, the work of sovereignty is proceeding at home without a hitch. The arrangements for the due celebration of Christmas in the royal household in the home-land were made with scrupulous care by the King and Queen before their departure.

The distribution of coal will be made as usual to the poor of the royal borough, and Queen Alexandra has taken upon herself the task, which she discharged for so many seasons, of superintending the distribution of meat and clothing to the domestics and tenantry at Sandringham.

Large quantities of gifts have been made ready for the entertainments to the occupants of the royal mansions at Buckingham Palace and Windsor, and no one in the royal employment will be forgotten because the King and Queen themselves are far away.

### DESERT LAND OWNERS URGING PATENTS

#### PETITION OREGON SOLONS TO SECURE PASSAGE OF BILL

Delay in Granting Homesteaders Clear Title to Holdings Is Charged to Dr. H. Waldo Coe Opponent of Reclamation Service Projects.

(Special Correspondence.) Hermiston, Dec. 21.—That the desert land holders are in earnest regarding the issuance of patents to their lands, is shown by the number of people who have signed the petition which will be mailed to the Oregon delegation, the president and secretary of the interior, Hon. A. W. Lafferty now has a copy of the bill these people wish to have passed and has promised that he will give this his attention. He states that he has hopes that he will be able to get this through this session. Mr. Lafferty had this bill last session of congress, but it is alleged, on account of Dr. Waldo Coe, who is said to have wished to have the bill changed and who is charged with making a statement that he represented the people of Hermiston, this did not receive the attention that it should have received. The secretary also has a copy and the people under this project are looking forward when this bill will be passed and they can sell off their lands.

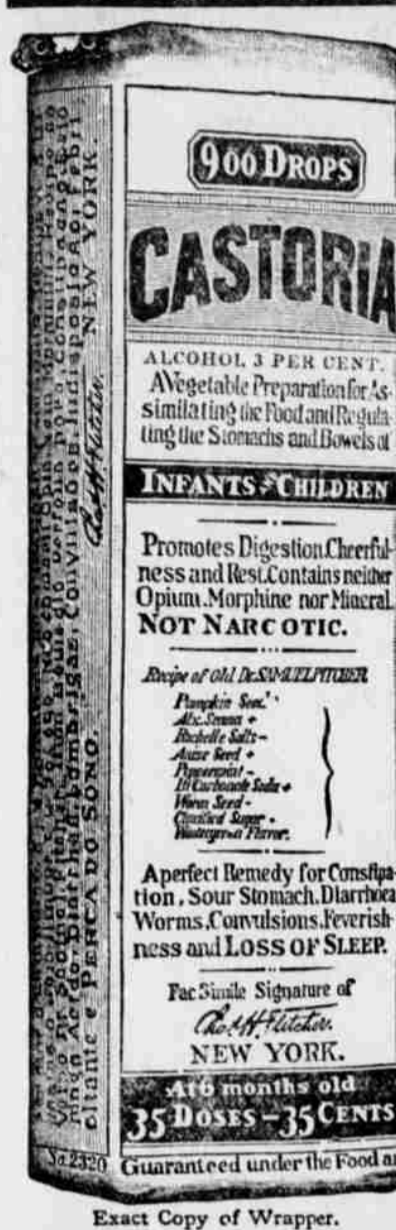
The Bill. Following is the bill the desert land people want passed by congress: That, where any bona fide desert land entry has been or may be embraced within the exterior limits of any irrigation project under the act entitled "An act appropriating the receipts from the sale and disposal of public lands in certain states and territories to the construction of irrigation works for the reclamation of arid lands" approved June 17, 1902, and the desert land entrymen or his assigns shall make proof showing full compliance with the provisions of the desert land laws as to reclamation, irrigation and improvements of said entry, and shall submit satisfactory proof that he has relinquished or abandoned all of the land embraced in said entry in excess of one hundred and sixty (160) acres and has given to the United States or to the Water Users' association, if one has been organized in the irrigation project in which the land is located, a lien upon the said land embraced in said entry, and all water rights appurtenant thereto, to secure the payment of all charges for water for the said land, and upon the payment of one (\$1.00) per acre for said land, final certificate and patent shall issue therefore, to the entryman or his assigns.

Postmaster Williams has just received notice from Washington that Hermiston has been designated as a postal savings depository, the branch to be opened here January 5, 1912. The new postoffice building is now under construction and will be finished in a short time.
