ARIZONA WILL ADOPT RECALL OF JUDICIARY

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 29.—That the first act of the first Arizona legislature will be submitting an amend-

ment to the voters, restoring to the constitution the provision for recall of judges, which was stricken out by President Taft's orders, is the firm belief of the newly elected chief justice of Arizona, Alfred Franklin, who is here visiting today. He said all Arizona favors the amendment.

REYES IN MEXICAN CAPITAL CITY PRISON

Mexico City, Dec. 29.—Charged with armed rebellion against the government, General Reyes today is in a cell in Santiago prison here. Reyes arrived last night under a heavy guard and is allowed to see no one but his counsel, until a court martial is held. It was learned today that several military authorities demand his execution, but it is believed President Madero will insist on the imposition of a lighter penalty because of Reyes' surrender.

SWEEPING PROBE OF KINDRED TRUSTS SOON

Washington, Dec. 29.—Chairman Henry of the house rules committee, announced today that the committee is determined to report the resolution, authorizing an investigation of the shipping trust, the harvester combine, and the money trust, by a committee of seven congressmen. "We are convinced these trusts are immediately related. It will mean the most sweeping probe of the trust evil ever instituted."

Ship Ashore.

Providence, R. I., Dec. 29.—The liner Georgia, was driven ashore by wind, striking on the mud flats in Narragansett Bay today. No great danger is apprehended for the vessel of the passengers aboard.

South Dakota, which provides for the election of the entire list of delegates from that state in a state-wide primary. The committee nullified the law, so far as it could do so, by providing that delegates should be elected according to the dual system of delegates at large, and two from each congressional district. The call disfranchises South Dakota, and also will disfranchise California, which

has recently passed a primary law similar to that of South Dakota.
