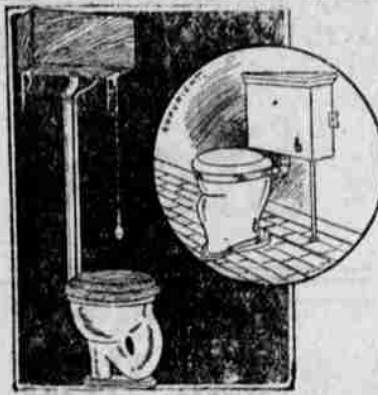


WESTON LADIES BAND GIVES A CONCERT

PERJURY CHARGE GROWS OUT OF ELOPEMENT

La Grande, Ore.—Ray Clark, a resident of Union, was bound over to the grand jury by Justice of the Peace Williams on the charge of perjury. This is the result of Clark's act in acting as a witness for the marriage license of Miss Vera Houghton to J. R. Workman, which couple

was married here yesterday. The license had been held up upon information of the girl's mother in Walla Walla, stating that the girl was only 15 years old. In obtaining the license the girl claimed to be past 18 years, but after the ceremony was performed stated that she was but 16 years old. Clark had sworn to her age at 18, and the arrest followed.

Two men sentenced to state penitentiary.

La Grande, Ore.—Two prisoners in the county jail have pleaded guilty in court and are sentenced to the state penitentiary. T. L. Jordan, who robbed Love's Jewelry store, of \$800 worth of goods, was given a sentence of from two to five years. He said he did not steal the goods, but was an accomplice to the robbery. George Whitaker, alias George Wood, who drove away with a horse and buggy belonging to W. J. Church on Halloween, was given a sentence of from one to 10 years. Whitaker claimed he was too drunk to know what he was doing.

Fire destroys home.

La Grande, Ore.—The home belonging to O. W. Moon and being occupied by Baggageman Freedman was destroyed with its contents by fire, the damage being estimated at \$1000, partially covered by insurance.

Navy grabs grabber of "Grabbenheimer".

Fake Hotel Bill to Cover Living Expenses at Home Causes Trouble.

Washington.—Harvey F. Williams, ordinance engineer of the navy department, has got into trouble with the comptroller of the treasury over a bill for \$1084 for board and lodgings at the Hotel "Grabbenheimer," which he established at Newport, R. I., for his convenience while at Newport developing the new torpedo he designed.

The bill was drawn to and receipted by Marj J. Williams. The officials made inquiries of the postmaster at Newport and others and were informed there was no Hotel "Grabbenheimer." Williams then sent the following explanation:

"As a matter of fact the 'Grabbenheimer' is a private boarding house which was established by the woman whose name appears as creditor on the 'Grabbenheimer' voucher, the establishment being for special benefit of her husband (myself) and to the end that there might not be a recurrence of severe illness which the latter suffered at the Perry House, an illness supposedly due to lack of warmth and other comforts to which he had long been accustomed."

The comptroller disallowed the bill.

The Humorous Barber.

New York.—The champion joker of Elizabeth, N. J., is dead, and while dying he planned a joke that he could play after death. He was George Seppel for many years a barber at 432 Front street. He provided for the placing of a silver plate on his coffin and told the inscription that he wanted. Friends who gathered at his funeral did not know whether to laugh or be shocked when they read the plate's legend. It was: "You're next."

SLIPS AWAY AND WEDS CHAUFFEUR

Wells College Girl Back Before Mama Awakes—Farm Hand Witness.

Auburn, N. Y.—Gertrude Loomis Terry of Syracuse, a student at Wells College in Aurora, was secretly married to her chauffeur, Richard James Probasco, in the Methodist parsonage in Ledyard at 2 a. m. last Saturday. It has just been learned. Mrs. Probasco kept the secret until she told her mother on board a train for St. Paul.

The romance began last July when Probasco was engaged to run Mrs. Alice Terry's automobile. Mrs. Terry had taken up her residence in Aurora while her daughter was in college. Late Friday night Miss Terry slipped from the apartment where her mother was slumbering in the Wayside Inn, the college hotel, and jumping into a car was driven up into the hill country to Ledyard, where the Rev. Mr. Crossley of the Methodist church was awakened.

The clergyman declined to perform the ceremony at first, but the pleadings of the couple won him over, and after James Brightman and a farmhand were reluctantly brought from a nearby farmhouse the ceremony was performed. The bride returned without discovery of her absence by her mother.

Beautiful Miss Russell Will Be Publisher's Bride.

New York.—Lillian Russell, the perennially young actress, is engaged to marry Alexander F. Moore, publisher of the Pittsburgh Leader, and a power in Western Pennsylvania politics. Miss Russell, at her home said so over the telephone and it was confirmed by Moore, who, after the manner of swains, was calling on his fiancée. The marriage will take place in May, according to present plans.

This will be Miss Russell's fourth venture, but no one who heard her girlish giggle over the telephone would have thought so. She has known Mr. Moore for about 10 years, she said. Reports of their coming marriage were published last May, but at that time it was denied by Miss Russell because the marriage date which had been set was so remote, she explained tonight.

Gones to Warn Deer.

Hartford.—Motormen must exercise the utmost care while running their cars in Connecticut to avoid killing deer, according to a bulletin from the state game commission. Game wardens are instructed to see that such care is taken and to prosecute offending motormen.

It is declared that a motorman, on seeing a deer, should slow down and if necessary stop until the animal is chased out of danger.

It is against the law to kill deer in this state. The animals have been plentiful in the suburban districts this year and many have been reported killed by interurban cars, especially at night, when the animals have been blinded by the glare of headlights.
