LONG FORGOTTEN BY DEATH.

Polish Relic of Eighteenth Century
Has No Living Contemporaries,
Berlin.—The claim of Frau Dutkiewitz of Posen born on February
21, 1785, to be the oldest woman in the oldest woman in the world is now contested by Mrs. Baba Vasi ka, who was born in May, 1784, in the little village of Bavelski, where she lived ever since. The record of her birth is preserved in a neighboring monasis preserved in a neighboring monas-

She is the daughter of a peasant and has worked herself as a peasant up till a compartively recent date. For more than 100 years she regularly worked in the fields, according to the custom of her country, where women are employed in all sorts of manual labor.

The events of her life up to the time when she attained the age of 80 are far more distinctly impressed on her mind than the happenings of

the last forty-six years, Her son, Tobor, following the family tradition, has also worked in the fields as a peasant all his life, but he has also taken part in various wars and rebellions in the Balkan peninsula. He is not quite so fresh and vigorous as his mother, although he is still capable of doing a good day's work and enjoying such small luxuries of life as a pipe and the strong spirits drunk by the Bulgar-

GOVERNOR WEST BELIEVES PEOPLE WILL VOTE IT DOWN

Receives Statistics From Other States Which Have Abolished Capital Punishment, Showing That The Effect Has Been Satisfactory.

Portland, Ore., Dec. 2 .- Governor Oswald West feels sure that in 1913 the people of Oregon will approve by votes at the polls his belief that capital punishment is wrong. He has re ceived statistics and expressions other governors from all over the United States approving his own deision that there shall be no more hangings in Oregon so long as he is governor unless the people at the next general election vote to continue the enforcement of the capital punishment

"These figures and telegrams from other governors prove," said Governor West, "not only that capital punishment has not been a deterent of crime in the states where it is practiced, but that crime has decreased in the state where capital punishment has been abolished and less barbarous and more humanitarian methods of punishment substituted."

Governor West has these telegrams: Against Hangings.

Governor Stubbs of Kansas-Kansas has not had a legal hanging in 40 years. Sentiment unanimous against capital punishment. Statistics positively favor this movement.

Governor Osborn of Michigan.-It is my opinion that the anti-capital punishment law now in vogue in this state is an unqualified success. It has conduced to more satisfactory results and better conditions in the administration of criminal justice. I am sure that Michigan would not revert to old conditions. Records show no increase in crime since hanging has been abol-

Governor Porter of Rhode Island-No increase in crime is attributed to the abolishment of capital punishment 40 years ago. No concerted effort has ever been made to revert to former methods.

In Kansas the capital punishment law was repealed three years ago as a dead letter, there never having been egal hanging in the state.
