

# PORTLAND MARKET SHOWING STRENGTH

## HOGS ADVANCE TWENTY-FIVE CENTS PER ONE HUNDRED

Arrival of Large Shipments of Cattle Do Not Weaken Market—Sheep Trade is Very Firm With Receipts Very Good.

(From Monday's Journal). Toward the close of business today the one load of hogs that arrived was reported sold at \$6.75, or an advance of 25c over previous prices. Cattle continued strong at previous prices. Sheep market was very firm at an advance of 10@25c.

Considering the fact that today was generally considered a holiday the arrival of a big bunch of cattle over Sunday was a surprise. Total offerings in the cattle division at North

Portland were 487 head compared with none last Monday, which was a holiday. That day's arrivals were combined with those of Tuesday when totals of 324 head were received.

The bulk of the good steers sold this morning at \$6, six loads being sold early in the morning at this figure while sales of cows were made at \$5 for similar quality.

The select offerings were not sold during the early day but on the basis of first transactions last week's best values will be maintained.

## BOARD OF CONTROL AIDED BY OPINIONS

Salem, Or., Jan. 2.—Several decisions of great interest to water users have been handed down by the supreme court recently, which will be of great assistance to the board of control, in passing upon questions pertaining to water rights in adjudications pending before it. The case of McCoy vs. Huntley, appealed from Wheeler county, is the first case in this state which recognizes what is known as the rotation system among appropriators; that is, where the court's decree requires a use of the water by the appropriators alternately, for stated periods of time, in proportion to their respective rights of use.

"The principle announced in this case will be of great importance in future adjudication of water rights, where there is such a scarcity of water in the stream that all the lands requiring irrigation cannot be irrigated under any other system of water distribution," said a member of the board of control. "Rotation in the use of water has always been provided for in the determination orders of the board, and the court decrees based thereon, as there can be no question as the rights increase numerically along the different streams and the supply consequently diminishes, that no other method of distribution will accomplish a proper division of the water. It is gratifying to know that our supreme court is paying so much attention to these highly important phases of water adjudications."

## GOVERNMENT FINDS IT CAN SAVE THE SEAL PUPS

Experiments Show They Will Live in Fresh Water and Can be Fed Artificially. Washington.—The government announces that the experiments with the seal pups recently brought from Alaska, two of which are at the New York aquarium, have demonstrated that these animals can be taught to take food when offered by man. They can be kept in captivity and carried long distances on vessels or railroad trains without any special difficulty. They will live and thrive in fresh water. A salt water environment is not essential. Moreover, the young seals can live without any apparent discomfort in water of a much higher temperature than their natural habitat.

There are now a round dozen of these seal pups in the United States, and the bureau of fisheries says it believes the success of the experiments shows a way for saving the hundreds of thousands of pups whose mothers are killed every year by the pelagic sea pirates. It would be necessary to feed the pups artificially only until the herd leaves the islands late in the fall. Then they might be permitted to leave the islands with the rest of the pups and their chances of survival in the sea would be quite as good as any. The supplying of fur seals to public aquariums and zoological parks is another possibility which seems practicable. The establishment of a colony of fur seals in some freshwater lake is another prospect.

The fur seals have proved to be the most interesting pets that have ever been kept in the Aquarium. They are the most expert swimmers imaginable.
