

# LIVESTOCK MARKET IS STILL STRONG

## ADVANCE IN PRICE OF HOGS IS MAINTAINED

Cattle Situation is Particularly Favorable to the Shippers and Added Strength is Shown—Sheep Are Up—Shorts Run for Cover.

(From Tuesday's Journal.) Strength continues in all lines of livestock. The advance in the price of hogs, exclusively told in The Journal yesterday, was fully maintained today, although there was only a very limited number coming forward to test the trade.

Five points recent has in a measure reduced the great differential that has existed between the price here and the cost of landing supplies from the Missouri river territory. However, today's advices, while telling of a weaker and lower price at South Omaha, makes the top there 2 1-2c above what it was last week, therefore forcing this addition to the cost of bringing stock here from there. On the basis of today's values at the Missouri river market, eastern swine cost \$7.27 1-2 t land here and at other Pacific northwest points. The best price available recently here has been \$6.75, which still makes the differential between the local price and the cost of getting eastern supplies here very heavy.

Today's run of hogs at North Portland, 314 head, compares with 449 head received both Monday and Tuesday of last week, Monday being a holiday.

**Cattle Extremely Strong.**  
The cattle situation is one of extreme strength. There was a run of 249 head today, compared with 324 head last Tuesday, the latter including Monday's arrivals, while those of today do not.

Prices obtained in the cattle division retain the extreme strength of last week, prices being just as high for similar quality. Heifers sold 25c higher at \$5.50.

Notwithstanding the expectations of a weaker tone in the cattle trade east of the Rockies, the market is really beginning to show added strength.

For instance, at South Omaha there was an advance of 10c in low grade stuff. This is expected to have an effect upon shipments in this direction from Montana and Wyoming points.

**Situation is Changed.**  
As matters stood formerly, while the Missouri river market was higher for high quality cattle, ordinary offerings were in reality lower than here. Therefor on that basis the shipments would be influenced in this direction. Recently, however, there has been a tendency at the Missouri river point to advance the price of ordinary quality cattle while holding the best stuff stationary. This has changed the situation to such an extent that a further advance here must be forced before it will be profitable for the eastern stuff to come in this direction.

**SOLDIERS GUARD MILLIONS.**  
Bank of England Building Nightly Held by Armed Troops.

London, Eng.—Visitors to the metropolis who happen to be in the vicinity of the Bank of England about 6:30 o'clock in the evening may witness one of the most interesting customs in London. For it is at that time that a detachment of armed guards march into the bank with fixed bayonets for the purpose of guarding the 20,000,000 pounds in gold and silver with which the vaults of the "Old Lady of Threadneedle Street" are usually stocked. This custom says the Pall Mall Gazette, dates back to the Gordon riots in 1780, when it was deemed necessary to call in soldiers to prevent the mob from raiding the bank. Since then the bank has been protected every night by a detachment of guards.

The detachment usually numbers about thirty men, in parade dress, with fixed bayonets and loaded ammunition belts, in charge of two sergeants and a lieutenant. These are the only troops that have the privilege on ordinary occasions, of marching through the city of London with fixed bayonets.

For guarding the bank the soldiers receive extra pay, which is given to them as soon as they enter the bank each night. Privates and drummer boy get 1 shilling each, corporals 1 shilling and 6 pence, and sergeants 2 shillings and 6 pence. This sum is exclusive of the subaltern's allowance. The aggregate cost of guarding the Bank of England is about 1000 pounds per annum.

The bank authorities do all they can for the soldiers' comfort. They provide them with extra blankets for the winter and a selection of books, while the lieutenant in charge has a snug little room, a dinner being brought into him from a neighboring tavern. He is also allowed to entertain two guests, the only stipulation being that they must depart before midnight.

Falling any emergency call, the majority of the soldiers merely perform sentry-go once a night for an hour. They are posted throughout the rooms of the banks and in the courts, the sentries being increased in the middle of the night and remaining on duty till the detachment returns to barracks at 6 o'clock in the summer and 7 in the winter.

With regard to the lieutenant there is a curious stipulation that he shall only have one bottle of wine for him self, and two for each of his guests, while the regulation is that each soldier shall not be allowed more than one pint of stout from the small canteen which has been established inside the bank for the convenience of the night guard.
