LEADS BOY HUSBAND HOME TO HIS MOTHER

San Francisco.—When Lulu and Paul Chambers, sixteen and nineteen years of age, decided to separate, she took him by the arm and led him to the home of his parents in Oakland. This was at 11 o'clock at night, and Chambers' mother came downstairs to find her son standing on the front porch, with suitcase in hand and his wife standing behind him with an alarm clock.

The young wife explained that she was returning her husband and their wedding presents in good condition. Then she left.

Young Chambers obtained an interlocutory decree of divorce in Oakland. He said that the separation was due to the amount of mail which his wife received from other young men and to her affection for night life.

KILLS A BLACK BEAR WITH BRASS KNUCKLES

Kentucky Turfman, Who Didn't Have a Gun, Gets Bruin Just the Same. Lexington.—Will Woodard, well-known local turfman, upon his return from Estill county, where he had been hunting for a week, displayed the pelt

of a black bear which he declares he had killed with brass knuckles. "With Joe Chenault of Madison county I went to White Springs as the guest of Gip Whitt for a week's run after the foxes," said Woodard. "In the wild country along the Kentucky river in Estill county the hounds hit a strange trail. After crossing and recrossing Browning creek several times the dogs brought a black bear to bay, and he was giving them a battle when we came up."

"Unprepared for such a hunt we had no guns or knives. We threw stones at the bear until I happened to think of a pair of brass knuckles I had in my coat pocket. Urging the dogs to greater tantalization of the bear I waited until he began to show fatigue and then rushed upon him. I struck him several rapid blows upon the head, quickly stunning him. Another deliberate, well-aimed blow with the knuckles and I had brained him. He weighed 237 pounds. I am going to have a rug made of that pelt."

Gives Husbands a Code.

Cincinnati.—Police Judge August Bode laid down a set of rules to husbands who are inclined to be abusive when their wives will not give them money. The judge formulated the

rules after hearing the case of Louis Monedlock, who had been unruly, the day before when his wife refused to give him money. The following are the rules:

You must not swear at your wife.
You must not hit her.
You must not abuse her by voice.
You must give her a full share of your wages for the support of the family.
You must not give her all your money on Saturday night and then beg it back during the week.

GIANT LINER IS ORDERED.

Hamburg.—The Hamburg-American Line has ordered a third 50,000-ton liner for the trans-Atlantic service. She will be constructed by Blohm & Voss at their private yard here and will be a sister ship to the liner Imperator, which has a length of 390 feet and a 90-foot beam. The Imperator, which is to go into service in the spring of 1913, will provide accommodation for 5000 passengers.

ARE PEACE TREATIES REALLY ALRIGHT?

NEW YORK PAPER OF G. O. P. FAITH THINKS NOT

Editorial Charges President Is Serving Sinister Purpose of His Own in Urging Ratification of Arbitration Agreement.

Washington, D. C., Jan. 5.—President Taft's persistence in advocating the adoption of his peace treaties unamended and after neglect of the really important questions which confront the country today are made the subject of a strong editorial in the New York Press, one of the staunchest republican papers in the United States. In commenting on the peace dinner in New York last Saturday the Press says:

"Nor did Mr. Taft improve his own position on this occasion any more than the cause of peace was enhanced by the fizzle. He contradicted himself comically. First he defended his peace contracts on the ground that they included questions of national honor and vital interest which are left out of existing arbitration treaties; and then he tried to prove that the very disputes which would be most likely to lead to war, such as the Monroe doctrine and our barring out of Asiatic immigrants, were excluded as questions which could not be arbitrated under the treaties. In one breath he says the documents mean a great deal and in the next breath he declares that they do not mean enough to make their opposition worth while."

"President Taft's arbitration policy has served a personal purpose to him but it was ill-advised. It has diverted public attention for much of the time from vital domestic issues to a visionary foreign policy which would much better be entrusted to a secretary of state who is a cipher in his administration. Mr. Taft chooses to concentrate his abilities energetically on a program that is always academic except when it is made perilous by the professional troublemakers and fanatics who have entangled him with their hobby."

"This administrative venture is undertaken at the expense of dodging profitable discussion of the elvise and pressing problems of railroad regulation, restoring free competition in the country's markets, injecting true democracy into the judiciary and the legislative service, and affording the people of the United States the Parcel Post facilities which he only half-heartedly favors. Topics like these, dealing with practical issues for a national campaign and not with the chimera of dreamers and cranks, could be treated without starting people on a panic-stricken rush away from a dinner attended by the president of the United States. When issues of immediate and acute concern to the American people are neglected by Mr. Taft to pursue the will-o'-the-wisp of world peace he weakens himself and he harms his party sorely."

JUDGMENT BY WIRELESS.

Supreme Court to Decide on Decision Made While Judge Was at Sea.

Washington.—Judicial sanction by wireless telegraphy while at sea is to be considered by the supreme court of the United States that its validity may be determined once for all.

The point arose in a suit over land in Porto Rico. Judge Rokey of the United States district court of Porto Rico directed an execution of time "in which a bill of exceptions" could be filed in the case, and the question brought to the supreme court, while he was on his way from Porto Rico to the United States.

He sent the message by wireless, and it is claimed he was still within the three-mile limit of Porto Rico.

CALIFORNIA DYNAMITE SUSPECTS ARE ON TRIAL

Los Angeles, Jan. 4.—After waiting six months in jail, Bert Connors, Ira Bender and A. P. Maple, labor leaders, who are charged with conspiracy to dynamite the Hall of Records building here, which was built by non-union labor, were brought to trial today. Each were granted separate trials. Maple and Bender will go to trial, officially, Monday.

IMPERIAL TROOPS SENT AFTER MUTINOUS SOLDIERS

Peking, China, Jan. 4.—Drafted from the garrisons at Pac Ting Fu and Shih Wang Tao, thirty thousand imperial troops are today marching on Chin Wang Tao and Lan Chow to attack the imperial troops who mutinied at these places, if they refuse to submit to capture and punishment for their act.

It is also reported that a large force of Manchurian troops, from Tibet have recaptured from the rebels Chang Lu, the capital of the province of Sze Chuen.

Rebels Protest to Powers.

Changhai, China, Jan. 4.—Wu Ting Fang, acting in behalf of the rebels to day, issued a protest to the powers against the action of Premier Yuan in disregarding the agreements made by his peace envoy and representative, Tang Shao Yi, which were expected to end the rule of the Manchus and to restore peace. Negotiations, looking toward peace, are now at the breaking point and it is likely that hostilities will be resumed at any moment.

Good for the Chinaman.

London.—Yuan Shi Kai the man of the hour in revolutionary China, is (writes a correspondent) an extraordinary personal example of the sweeping change in the attitude of

Chinese leaders to Christianity since the Boxer rising. "This man, who is dictator of the situation in China today, with a score of his own nominees in high office as the price of his own assumption of power, has this year sent four of his sons and a nephew to the Anglo-Chinese college, Tientsin, the London Missionary society's great educational institute in China. Yuan Shi Kai has given a splendid hall to the Anglo-Chinese College, which has his portrait hanging in it."
