HOGS AGAIN GO TEN CENTS HIGHER

KILLERS SHOW FAVORABLE TO WESTERN RAISED SWINE

Sheep and Lamb Receipts Heavy With Market Holding Firm—Cattle Offerings Limited With Prices Good—Chicago Wheat Advances.

(From Friday's Journal.) There was a further advance of 10c in the price of hogs at North Portland today; fully justifying the recent predictions made in this paper that the killers here were not paying enough for the swine produced at home.

Top hogs sold at \$6.95 in the North Portland yards this morning, several lots being taken hold of at that figure.

Total offerings in the hog division were 304 head today compared with 32 head last Friday. No shipments of eastern hogs have been made thus far this week, therefore local offerings continue to fill the wants of packers. As they are of better quality than recent importations from the Missouri river section, the trade contends that they should bring a higher price than the outside stock can be landed here.

Sheep and Lamb Firm. A very firm tone is ruling in the sheep and lamb trade at North Portland. Receipts for the day were 1004 head, compared with 475 head last Thursday.

While the price remains practically the same, demand is much heavier. One of the lots of spring lambs that arrived this morning was shorn and went direct to a local meat company. Ordinary lambs sold at \$5.50 this morning, white ewes of equal quality went at \$3.50.

\$15,000 AS BEQUEST FOR WOMAN SUFFRAGE. Des Moines, Iowa.—Fifteen thousand dollars in cash is left to the cause of woman suffrage by the terms of the will of the late Mrs. Mary J. Coggeshall, which was admitted to probate. Mrs. Coggeshall was one of the most prominent workers in Iowa.

The will stipulates that her administrator is to pay \$10,000 in cash to the National Woman's Suffrage association and \$5,000 in cash to the Iowa Equal Suffrage association. It is ordered that the amounts be paid as soon after testator's death as practicable.

Mrs. Coggeshall was a member of the executive committee of the national women's board, with headquarters at New York City.
