BUCKING BRONCHO FOILS LOOTER OF BIXBY BANK

Thief Holds Up Cashier, Gets \$700 and Then Tries to Ride Away, But Texas Cow Pony Wills Things Otherwise.

Tulsa, Okla.—Walking into the bank of Bixby, a small town fifteen miles southeast of Tulsa, a man pointed a revolver at Cashier Lipscomb and obtained \$700.

The thief then rushed out of the bank and mounted a horse, which, however, was a Texas broncho and commenced bucking.

The cashier had given the alarm and the man was pulled from his horse by a crowd that had congregated. He was found to be O. C. Brock, dishwasher in a Bixby restaurant and was placed in jail.

OVER SNOW TO HOSPITAL.

Parents Drag Their Injured Son on Bobbed.

Portland, Ore.—After having been dragged on a bobbed by his father and mother alternately three miles

through the snow to the nearest neighbor and then driven in a buggy 15 miles to the nearest railroad station, Martin Reh, age 5 lies on a cot at the St. Vincent hospital with a broken arm.

The youngster, who lives with his parents on a homestead in the Coast range mountains 28 miles from Hillsboro, broke his arm in a fall Sunday. The day was bitterly cold and the snow deep. The accident occurred about 8:30 o'clock in the morning and it was late in the evening when the child reached the hospital.

YAKIMA FIRE—\$150,000.

Boy Steps on Match and Miller Building Damaged.

North Yakima, Wash.—Damage of more than \$150,000 was done in one hour and a half to the six-story Miller building by fire which started in the basement at 2:30 o'clock. A boy who stepped on a match near some oil waste is said to have started the blaze. Damage to the building will probably amount to half its value. It was held at \$190,000 by its owner.

CRAWLS TWO MILES ON FROZEN HANDS

Asotin, Wash.—Daniel Heather, known throughout this section as "King Oscar," a quartz miner on Captain John creek, 15 miles south from here, while under the influence of liquor at an early hour went to sleep along the road about five miles from here and when he awoke found both hands and feet frozen.

The man crawled two miles to the home of George Ausman, aroused the occupants and was brought here.

The physicians state amputation of his hands will be necessary, but Heather refuses to permit it, stating he would rather be allowed to die.

The unfortunate man was in Lewiston Friday, where he was jailed for intoxication.

He arrived here Saturday and left here early in the morning to walk to his home, with the weather below zero.

IN ONE OYSTER, 38 PEARLS.

Colfax, Wash.—While eating oyster soup, J. F. Neal, proprietor of the O. K. baths, discovered 38 pearls in one oyster, five of which were of a comparatively large size.

It is estimated that if the pearls had not been spoiled by cooking they would have been worth about \$100.

PORTLAND LAWYER SHOT BY UNKNOWN

A. E. CLARK WOUNDED WHILE VISITING AT SALEM

Fact That Attorney Was Very Active in Securing Evidence Against Bank Wrecker Wilde Is Considered Significant by His Friends.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 10.—The shooting at Salem at an early hour yesterday morning of A. E. Clark, an attorney of this city, created a great sensation in this city where Mr. Clark is well known, and recently prominent in the investigation of the affairs of the defunct Oregon Trust and Savings bank and the subsequent indictment of Louis J. Wilde, a banker of San Diego for alleged embezzlement of funds of the Oregon Trust and Savings bank.

Rumors flew thick and fast regarding the shooting and there was much speculation as to who could have fired the shot, one of which passed through Clark's left forearm, inflicting a superficial wound, and the second bullet flattening itself among some papers which Clark was carrying in a leather case under his coat. But for the leather case and papers the bullet would have penetrated near the heart.

That robbery was not the purpose of the would-be assassin is indicated in the fact that he ran from the scene immediately without attempting to rob Clark, who was able to walk to the police station and report the affair and then proceeded to a doctor's office where the wound was dressed.

Mr. Clark reached Portland last night, but beyond a recital of the circumstances of the shooting declined to make a statement or to hazard a "guess" as to why he was shot or by whom.

The case of Wilde has attracted wide attention by reason of Wilde's prominence in his home city and his former activities here, also because of the late date of his indictment, the bank having failed several years ago. Attorney Clark was the active legal counsel in the case, acting for the depositors, and has carried on his investigations ever since the bank closed its doors in August, 1907.

By reason of his intimate knowledge of the bank's affairs, Clark was engaged to act with District Attorney Cameron in the Wilde case.

W. Cooper Morris, former cashier of the bank is serving a term in the penitentiary for his alleged illegal acts in the conduct of the bank's affairs. Morris is expected to be a witness in the Wilde case.

SMUGGLING BY AN ARMY OFFICER

Charge Made of Failure to Declare Dutiable Goods.

San Francisco.—Colonel Daniel Cornman, commanding officer of the Seventh United States Infantry, is facing criminal prosecution by reason of his failure to declare dutiable merchandise when customs inspectors boarded the transport Sherman. As it is, the customs department has seized a quantity of merchandise brought from the orient by the colonel and his wife, and Collector of the Port Stratton said today that the result of the investigation to be held will determine whether or not the army officer is to be prosecuted.

When the customs inspectors boarded the Sherman Colonel Cornman and his wife were asked if they had anything to declare. They declared in the negative and the inspectors went to the trouble of making plain the law. Then six trunks and six other pieces of baggage were searched and the dutiable goods were found, some of the articles secreted in such a manner as to convince the customs men that a deliberate attempt to smuggle them had been made.

Collector Stratton said that if the investigation developed only a failure to declare that the only punishment would be a fine treble the value of the articles confiscated. If criminal intent is proved the collector said he would force a vigorous prosecution. The value of the articles has not been determined, but it is believed it will approximate \$1000.

DESPONDENT GIRL IS SUICIDE.

Had Received Letter from Mother Who Disliked Her.

Winfield, Kan.—A mother's letter, telling a story of a child unwelcomed and despised at birth and later spurned to the point of being disowned, is held by the authorities as largely responsible for the act of Leola Killion, 16 years old, who had swallowed four grains of strychnine and was found dead at a boarding house here.

The girl's mother lives in Wichita. The letter says in part:

"You know I never did want you in the first place. I don't care for you now. I wouldn't do anything for you if you were dying and you could not come to see me if I were dying." Friends to whom Leola showed the letter say she was despondent after its receipt. Before taking the poison the girl wrote a note to her mother, which was found torn to bits. In the note she said she had been deceived by a young man she loved.

JAPANESE NAVAL HERO DIES; ILLNESS IS BRIEF

Tokio.—Vice Admiral Ijichi Admiral Togo's flag officer during the Russo-Japanese war and one of Nippon's naval heroes, died here after a brief illness.

Following the war with Russia, in which Admiral Ijichi played a brilliant part, he was assigned to the head of the training department of the Japanese navy. Later he was detailed to command the two Japanese training ships that were sent to America waters when the anti-Japanese feeling in California was at its height.

DREDGE DIGS UP OLD SKULLS.

Ellensburg City Clerk Gets Box of Weird Curios.

Ellensburg, Wash.—Deputy City Clerk James McKinstry received from Ditchwalker Jones at the electric light plant a box of skulls bones and Indian beads unearthed by the dredge widening the canal. An ancient burying ground, the location of which was unknown to the oldest settlers were thrown on the dump. Among the articles received by Mr. McKinstry were an elk skin pouch, evidently used for gold dust, and a woven basket. The most interesting article in the collection was a small beadwork bracelet, which was found around the arm bone of a child. This showed careful workmanship, and the beads were sewed onto thick hide. In the collection is a piece of wampum, Indian money. The bit of shell is varicolored, and is round and flat, about the size of a dime.

Nevadans Object to Fight.

Salt Lake City, Utah, Jan. 10.—A spirit of bitter opposition to the proposed Johnson-Flynn bout has developed throughout Nevada, according to advices received here. Nevadans say that any benefits from a battle staged near the Nevada-Utah line will accrue to Salt Lake City, while any odium attached to a fight will remain with the state of Nevada.

A proposal to call a special session of the Nevada legislature to repeal the law under which unlimited ring battles are sanctioned has been discussed freely among men prominent in politics in Nevada, and there is small doubt that Governor Odie will be urged to do his utmost to prevent the battle.

Metropolis, Nevada, has notified Promoter Jack Curley that the offer of a site for the arena and other inducements to bring the battle to that town has been withdrawn. Wendover, mentioned by Curley, as the site of the battle, but it is probable he intends to place the arena across the state line.

CALIFORNIA POLITICIAN WANTED AT WHITE HOUSE

Only Has to Do Four Things to Make Himself Popular With the President. Washington.—There is urgently wanted at the white house a Californian who can do four things. He must be able to defeat the indorsement of La Follette for the presidency, suppress any rising California sentiment for Roosevelt, send a Taft sentiment to the republican national convention and assure Taft a majority in the 1912 election.

Anyone who thinks he can fill this bill will be given a warm welcome and a respectful hearing by the white house political junta. With the elimination of Congressman Knowland from the California leadership the white house forces are again at sea.
