

LIVESTOCK RECEIPTS HEAVY; PRICES UP

DELAYED SHIPMENTS BRING
OUT NUMBER OF BUYERS

Hogs Advance Another Five Cents
and Cattle Also Show Much
Strength—Sheep Market Improves
—Wheat Shorts Scared.

(From Wednesday's Journal.)

The livestock train expected at noon arrived on time and contained 87 head of hogs, 338 cattle and 1055 sheep. This makes the total movement for the day 1262 hogs, 521 cattle and 15 calves and 1756 sheep.

Delayed shipment of livestock to North Portland brought forth all the buyers in this territory today, and under competition prices responded to the better feeling.

Hogs advanced another 5c, with sales at \$7 during the morning. There was a very heavy offering of porkers in the pens this morning, total receipts being 1165 head, compared with 411 last Wednesday. The hogs came

forward from eastern Oregon points principally, but a springling of supplies was shown from the Willamette valley.

The strength in the swine trade locally was shown in the face of a further decline in the east and central west. This more clearly shows that prices formerly obtainable here were too low until mention of that fact was made by the Journal.

Cattle Market Is Better.

The stuff attracted most attention from buyers in the cattle division of the local market today. While there was only a small run available for the morning train, further shipments were due on the delayed freight about noon.

Twenty-nine heifers that averaged 1058 pounds went at the \$6 mark during the morning, creating an entirely new high record for the present movement. Ordinary cow stuff of quality brought \$5.25, which in itself is about 10c more than the previous market, a condition exclusively forecasted by the Journal yesterday.

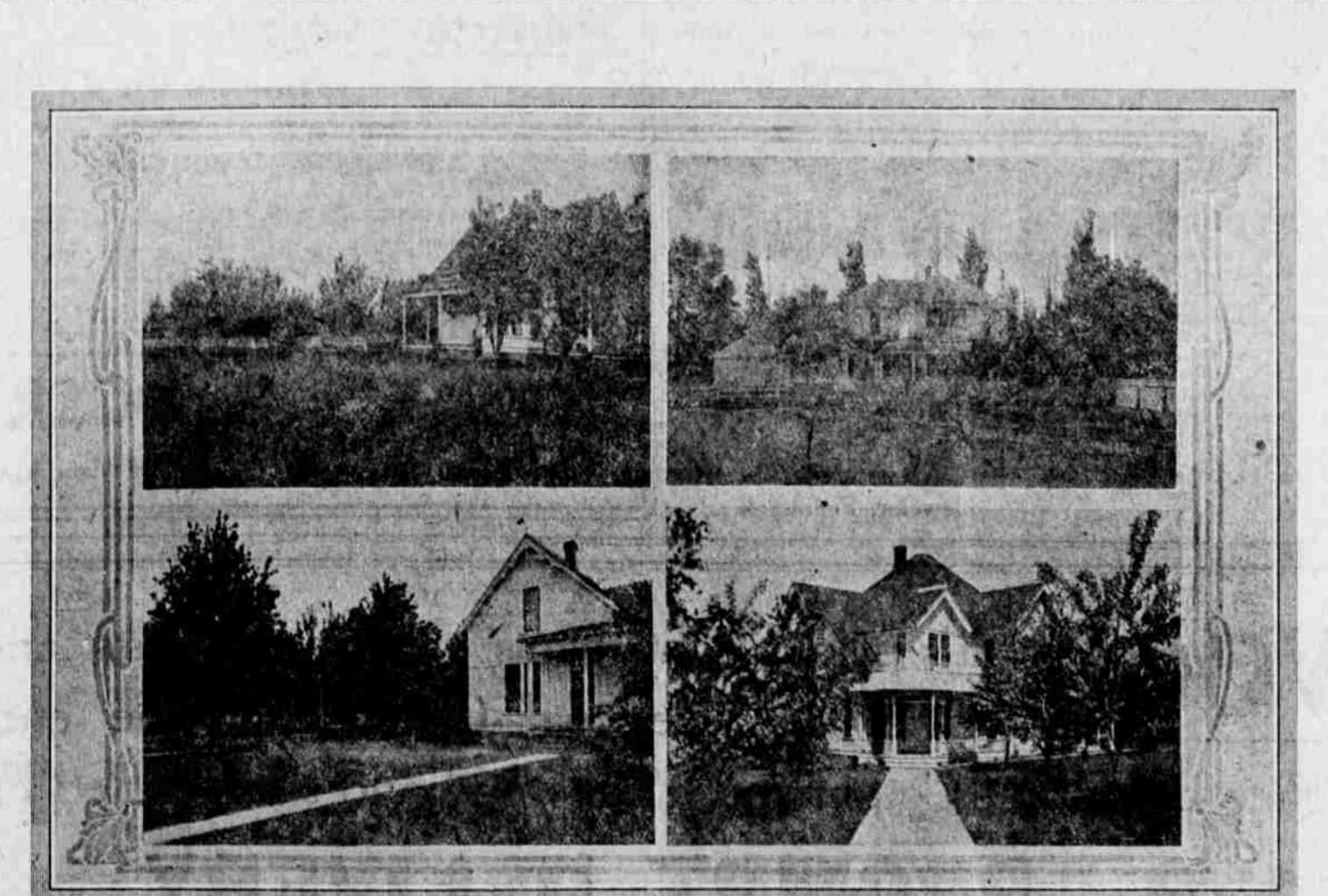
