MYSTERY TURNS INTO FARCE.

Student of Journalism Admits a Handmade Plot.

Olathe, Kan.—Blood stains in a deserted mill in Olathe that for two days kept county authorities busy running down a supposed murder clew, have been found to be the work of journalistic aspirants, who, as a hoax, killed a rooster, spattered his blood about the building and on a heavy iron bar found there.

Hairpins and strands of woman's hair found also are believed to have been placed there by the jokers. The authorities had dragged several ponds and old wells for the body.

Kansas City newspapers sent staff correspondents to Olathe to investigate the mysterious murder.

"The false idea of two young aspirants for journalistic reputations as to what constitutes a 'big story,' was responsible for the 'crime.'"

The mystery was the result of the close application of William W. Ferguson to his future profession—journalism. Ferguson said that he developed the idea of the mystery while he was a student in the School of Journalism at the University of Kansas. Its practical application came after an argument with members of the

class at Lawrence, he said:

"I am in a class called 'Short-Story Writing,' and one of the requirements is to develop plots for stories," Ferguson said.

"Of course, one can write about imaginary situations, but I thought I would be just a little original and make a real live plot. We were dealing with murder mysteries, so I framed this one up."

Huntington, W. Va.—A new version of the old story of Enoch Arden was given here when Frank Johnson, ten years a wanderer, came home and found his wife married to another.

Years ago Johnson wooed and won Elsie Pickering. Fortune smiled for a time. Then the fickle dame turned her back on the pair and Johnson left home to seek her out. He did not come back and his wife heard nothing from him.

For a time she mourned him for dead, and then wed an old sweetheart, Porter McCloud. Johnson arrived home after dark and peering through the window saw his wife and

her husband eating their evening meal.

He went in, shook hands with his successor and congratulated the pair. To celebrate the occasion Johnson sent one of the children out for a can of beer, which the three drank, and for hours thereafter there was a sound of revelry in the house.

POOL BALL IN HIS MOUTH.

Boastful Youth Loses Five Teeth in Getting it Out.

Philadelphia.—Robert Wilson, a youth living at 1330 North Eighth street, made a bet with several companions that he had the largest mouth in the crowd and to prove his assertion thrust a pool ball between his jaws.

He won the wager, but lost several teeth, for the ivory ball fitted his mouth so well that it took two hours' work on the part of physicians at the Children's Homeopathic Hospital to remove the ball, and that was accomplished only after the forceps had been used.

HIT BY A MOUNTAIN SLIDE.

Pottsville, Pa.—Frank and Bruno Tucker, while picking their way over the mountain between St. Clair and Morea, met with a most remarkable accident.

They were caught by a landslide of earth and rocks and carried for about a quarter of a mile down the mountain side and dropped upon the Pennsylvania railroad tracks.

RAILWAY MAIL CLERKS WANTED

The United States civil service commission announces an examination on February 7, 1912, at all places at which city delivery service has been established in the states of California, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, Oregon and Wyoming, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill vacancies as they may occur in the position of clerk in the Railway mail service, in the states mentioned at entrance salaries of \$300 per annum, unless it is found to be in the interest of the service to fill such vacancies by reinstatement, transfer or promotion.

Only men who are bona fide residents of the states mentioned above will be admitted to this examination.

The commission also announces an examination to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of editorial assistant, at a salary of \$1800 per annum, in the bureau of education, department of the interior, and vacancies requiring similar qualifications as they may occur, unless it is found to be in the interests of the service to fill the vacancy by reinstatement, transfer or promotion.

The duties of the position will include the preparation of matter on educational topics for the daily press, periodicals, and other publications.

It is desired to secure a person who has had opportunities to know school work, who has ability and experience as a writer for the public press and periodicals, who is acquainted with newspaper men, and who has a knowledge of the mechanical side of printing and publishing.

Applicants should at once apply for application forms at Lester B. Cronin at the Pendleton post office.

ROMANTIC ETHEL CROKER SUES GROOM FOR DIVORCE

Tammany Boss' Beautiful Daughter Accuses Stable Employee of Misconduct.

New York.—Ethel Croker Breen, the young and beautiful daughter of Richard Croker, former boss of Tammany Hall, has filed in the Supreme Court here an action for absolute divorce from John J. Breen, the riding master she married under romantic circumstances in April, 1910.

The papers were placed in record secretly September 25 and November 30 last and nothing was known of their presence in court.

Breen, who astounded exclusive social circles in the spring of 1910 by admitting his marriage to Miss Croker, his pupil, has served a general denial of the charges in the complaint. His answer has not yet been filed.

Mrs. Breen charges her husband with at least three specific acts of misconduct.

Breen recently filed in the Supreme Court an action for \$100,000 damages against Richard Croker and Croker's two sons. He charged in that proceeding that the Crokers had alienated the affections of Mrs. Breen and had been instrumental in keeping her separated from her husband.

Breen is now said to be in Peterboro, Ont., where he is head groom for J. R. Stratton, M. P. Mrs. Breen is with her mother and sister in Paris. The two Croker boys are in New York and their father is sojourning at Palm Beach.

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AMERICAN IS SHOT DOWN BY MILLINER

Wealthy Expatriate is Attacked by Former Servant; Blackmail, He Says.

Berlin.—Norbert M. Rodkinson, a prominent member of the American colony here, was shot—it is said fatally—by a milliner named Alwyne Siede.

The woman was intercepted as she was escaping from Rodkinson's office and immediately fired a bullet into her own body, which is not, however, likely to prove fatal.

The affair, according to the allegations of Miss Siede's friends, was brought about by the interruption of long-standing relations between her and Rodkinson and his refusal to support her two children.

Rodkinson, however, asserts that it was an attempt at extortion on the part of Miss Siede, who had been a servant of the family years ago in Russia.

No hobble skirt. Dresses must be made two and a half yards wide, three quarters of a yard wider than the hobble. They must be short, three inches from the ground. Blue and white are the colors, and the materials whipcords.

Reverse and sailor collars will be tabooed, but collars will be of another color than the coats. No changes are ordered in plain tailored gowns or suits.
