SOLDIERS TELL OF FIGHTS WITH MOROS

Time Expired Men Returning on Transport Sherman Talk of Recent Campaign.

San Francisco.—The Moros of Mindanao and Jolo Islands have started a holy war of extermination against American soldiers and civilians, according to reports brought to this city by the army transport Sherman, which arrived from the Philippines. As a result, several hundred of the head hunters and a few Americans have been killed in the jungle fights.

A couple of years ago, Datto Ali, the leader of the Mohammedan fanatics on the island of Jolo, was killed. His death has rankled in the minds of his followers, and from time to time "hermantados," or religious fanatics, have harassed the American troops.

Murders of sentries and venture some planters grew more frequent and emboldened by their successes, the tribesmen banded together in the belief that by combined effort they could stamp out the intruders.

In order to check this movement the officials at Washington instructed the military commanders in the southern islands of the Philippines to disarm all the Moros. In retaliation, the dattos declared a holy war.

Eventually the situation became so serious and the tribesmen were gaining such headway with the assistance of modern fighting equipment smuggled in from the straits Settlements, that General Funston was ordered from Manila to take charge of the situation just prior to the sailing of the Sherman for this port. Recent dispatches indicate that the trouble is practically over and that the Moros are turning in their arms.

SEND PINE CONES TO EUROPE.

Bemidji, Minn.—Jack pine cones from the forests of northern Minnesota, are to be shipped to European countries, taking up the work of reforestation and a campaign for their collection has been inaugurated in the vicinity of Cass Lake, Bemidji and other cities in Wadena county. Fifty cents a bushel is offered for the cones.

A Connecticut concern has a contract to ship large consignments of the cones to Switzerland, France, England, Germany, Japan and other countries and has appealed to the Minnesota forestry board to assist in the work of collection. In Connecticut the seeds will be extracted by a special scientific process before being shipped abroad.

Often more than a bushel of cones may be secured from one tree. The new industry is being eagerly seized upon as a winter occupation by many northern Minnesota people.
