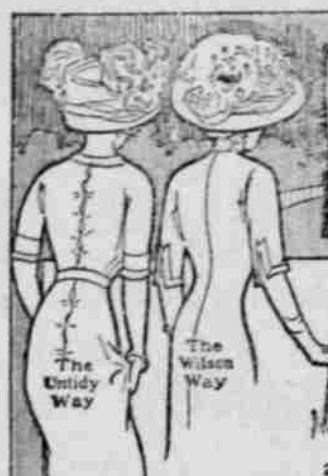

WALLA WALLA HEN SHOW IS BEST YET

TWELFTH EXHIBITION
OPENS WITH 400 ENTRIES

Choice Poultry Is Viewed by Many People on First Day of Annual Show.

Every pen was occupied when the Twelfth Annual Poultry show opened its doors to the public yesterday afternoon, in the neighborhood of 400 entries being booked during the forenoon, and never before in the poultry history of Walla Walla have such high class birds been shown here, says the Walla Walla Union this morning.

Most of the chickens have been exhibited so many times and are so used to being the objects of admiration that the onlookers and petters do not phase them a bit, they keep right on scratching. While many surprised exclamations were drawn forth from would-be fondlers, especially from ladies, when they attempted to pet a game cock or some other ill-tempered king of the fowl, nearly all of the exhibits are fond of petting and will sit with their heads between the bars of their cages as long as the stroking continues.

Plenty of amusement marked the first day's show. The turkeys started the fuss. The birds were placed in the Third street window, which was formerly used for the show window of a dry goods store. Everything was lovely the first few minutes, but a mirror in one end of the booth happened to catch the gobbler's attention, and the warlike gobbler in the glass seemed about to disturb the peace. The real gobbler was game, and a spirited fight ensued, in which he got the worst of it. Then the hens came to the rescue of their lord, running their bills up and down the glass and attempting to pull hair with the strangers. The turkeys refused to be reconciled to the fakes, and the poultrymen were forced to cover the mirror with a paper. Then a large dog came along and at sight of the big turkeys he gave one bound and leaped at the window, shattering it. The noise brought a rush of people, but not until the gobbler was in the street. The Tom was captured and netting placed over the break.

Another feature of the show which is little appreciated on account of its significance, is the Plymouth exhibit. These birds closely resemble the Plymouth Rock, and they are the only native American standard breed, according to poultrymen. From crosses of this variety come the Plymouth Rocks and crosses and recrosses with imported birds have created many of the other standard breeds.

In the Brown Leghorn pen, which well represent that family is one national champion. The cockerel took a first at Chicago in competition with eighteen birds from different breeders, and he is a perfect specimen of important young cockhood. Every feather lies just exactly where it ought to, and the saddle plumage, of a brilliant bronze with a sheeny green stripe through the center, drops over the sides as smoothly and delicately as a dandy's hair.

Elmer Gimlin of Illinois, who has been secured to judge the chickens, did not arrive yesterday on account of a misconnection at Pendleton, but he will begin the task of judging early this morning.

SEEKS PRISON TO REGAIN HIS HEALTH

Canon City, Colo.—That one of the convicts serving a term in the Colorado state prison here pleaded guilty to the charge against him solely to get the benefit of the prison treatment for consumption, was made known here through an admission by the prisoner himself.

Albert Blunt, age 23, a victim of tuberculosis, who was utterly destitute and suspected of burglary at Grand Junction, declares he confessed a crime he did not commit in order to enter the penitentiary, where he would have a chance to effect a cure. He says he was dying of the disease in the jail at Grand Junction, and decided that his only means of regaining his health was to secure his conviction of the crime of which he was suspected and he be sent to the penitentiary.

That he did well there is no denying, for since he entered the penitentiary last May he has gained 15 pounds.

"My sentence in the penitentiary is from two to three years," said Blunt, "and I hope at the end of that time I will be able to go out in the world and earn a living."

DON'T LET HUBBY DANCE.

Estranged Wife of Academy Proprietor Gives Advice to Women. Philadelphia.—Mrs. Edith Stokley, the pretty wife of Thomas P. Stokley, a contractor and proprietor of a dancing academy, advised women if they value their happiness not to let their husbands have anything to do with dancing. She has a writ of habeas corpus issued to get possession of her three-year-old daughter. The Stokleys separated eighteen months ago after Stokley became interested in the dancing hall.

"We were very happy," said Mrs. Stokley, "until my husband invested in this dancing hall. Almost immediately he saw younger and prettier women than his wife and we have not had a happy day since."

RICHES EMBARRASS FUND.

Gift of \$2,000,000 to N. Y. Presbytery Makes Everybody Quit Lilies. New York.—Because John S. Kennedy bequeathed \$2,000,000 to the church extension committee of the New York Presbytery most of the contributors, thinking their money is no longer needed, have stopped their annual payments, leaving the Presbytery poorer than ever and not sure that it would not be better off if the big gift had not been received. The committee reports the liquidation of \$750,000 of church debts, leaving \$1,100,000 of the Kennedy fund. The contributions to the committee have totaled about \$100,000 annually in the past, but now they have dropped to less than half of that figure.

BUYS FINE GAINSBOROUGH.

London.—Another great English picture destined for America is the famous Gainsborough portrait of Countess Ferrera, whose husband was hanged in 1760, which has been sold to an unnamed New York commissioner for \$50,000.

Application was made in the London law courts on behalf of Lord Zouche, the owner for a hearing of his request for leave to sanction the sale. The picture is an heirloom of a branch of the Curzon family, of which Zouche is the head. As Lord Zouche's heir presumptive, his sister, the Hon. Dorea Curzon, has consented to the sale.

MRS. TAFT GAINS FAME WITH CHICKEN SALAD

Celebrities Snack Lips Over Creation of Mistress of the White House. Washington.—The President and Mrs. Taft entertained at luncheon in honor of the American ambassador to London and Mrs. Whitelaw Reid.

This salad, which is made under Mr. Taft's personal direction, is after the following recipe: Equal parts of white meat of chicken and hard boiled eggs cut in dice, sprinkling of celery and white nuts, the whole being covered with mayonnaise.

RUSSIAN BOYCOTT OF U. S. FARM MACHINERY GROWS

German, Austrian and Russian Manufacturers Take Advantage of the Situation.

London.—The Standard's Odessa correspondent says: "Some forty Zemstvos in the governments of Kherson, Ekaterinoslav, Poltava, Kieff and Volhynia have declared a rigorous boycott against American agricultural machinery."
