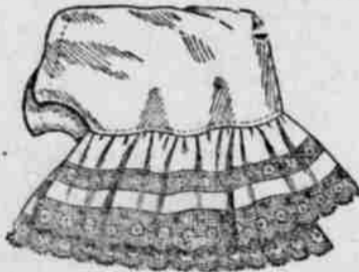

With a growl, the beast rose on its haunches and tried to shake off its unwelcome rider. Failing, it rushed back and forth along the narrow ledge, brushing against rocks and trees.

Smith's grip upon the animal's windpipe soon began to have its effect. The animal's eyes bulged from its head and it fell on the ground helpless. In an instant Smith's teeth were buried in the bear's windpipe, and the huge form became lifeless.

RANGE WAR LEADS TO A GUN DUEL

Lewiston, Idaho, Jan. 19.—A row between cattlemen and sheepmen along the Washington-Oregon boundary in a wild section of the Grande Ronde country resulted in the shooting of Press Montgomery by Gidge Tippitts.

Montgomery was brought to a Lewiston hospital, the trip having been made from the Grande Ronde by boat. He is suffering from four bullet wounds and his recovery is considered impossible. Two of the bullets entered his body in such a manner as to strike the spinal column, producing complete paralysis of the lower part of the body. Tippitts surrendered, alleging self defense. Both men are prominent in the stock business in the Grande Ronde section.

LITTLE MOTHERS' SCHOOLS OPEN

Thirty-Two Will Be in Session for First Time This Afternoon.
Chicago, Ill.—Thirty-two "little mothers' schools" will be opened in public school buildings. It is expected that more than 1000 girls of the upper grades of the elementary schools will attend.

They will be taught how to take care of the baby, how to clothe, bathe, feed and put it to sleep. If a baby cries, they will be shown how to find out what is the matter.

This instruction is directed by the health department. Dr. George B. Young, health commissioner, has assigned a nurse to each school to take charge of the classes. Life-sized dolls will be used.
