DR. WILEY IS PRAISED IN REPORT TO CONGRESS

Taft is Criticized for Failing to Remove Enemies of Chief Chemist.

Washington.—Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief government chemist and advocate of the strict enforcement of the pure food law, is exonerated from violations of the law and commended for his work in a report of the department of agriculture.

In the report President Taft is criticized for his failure to remove Solicitor George P. McCabe and Associate Chemist F. L. Dunlap, who are alleged to be at the head of a cabal to force Dr. Wiley out of the service.

Recommendations for a most strict enforcement of the pure food act and the creation of a separate bureau un-

der the direction of Dr. Wiley will be made. This bureau will report direct to President Taft and not to Secretary Wilson.

Chairman Moss of the investigating committee announced lately that he will not resume his probe into the department of agriculture until the house passes upon the Wiley report. Then he will investigate Willis Moore head of the weather bureau, who is accused of using funds without authorization for the employment of special experts.

NEW DRESS FOR EIFFEL TOWER
Painting of Immense Structure Entails a Cost of \$15,000.

Paris.—The time is nearly due for the Eiffel tower to have the ravages of time and the weather removed from its mighty form. This operation, which takes place every six years, entails a cost of some \$15,000 and keeps a special company of painters busy for three or four months distributing 60,000 pounds of paint over its 60,000 square feet area. The color of its new dress has not yet been chosen. Hitherto a new tint has been used at each repainting: orange in 1889, red in 1893, golden yellow in 1890, white at the summit and chrome yellow at the base in 1907.

READ STONE AGE SAGA IN PREHISTORIC FIND

Pleistocene Tragedy Speaks to Park Museum Folk from Mastodon's Mouth.

San Francisco.—The successful termination of a mastodon hunt held in prehistoric ages by Pleistocene man is echoed in the receipt of three giant molars and a stone hatchet at the Golden Gate Park Museum.

The teeth, which are partially opalized, formed part of a skull discovered by miners who were sinking a shaft in Shasta county. The stone hatchet was discovered lying directly

beneath the skull and was evidently one of the weapons with which the prehistoric hunters brought down their quarry.

As the hatchet is a perfect one the museum folk further was killed by the mastodon before being brought down. Otherwise, they argue, the weapon would not have been left behind.

According to Professor William G. Blunt, who is in charge of the natural history department of the museum the hatchet may be somewhere above two thousand years of age. It is also certain that it was made and used by a race of men who existed long before the Indian. The gift was made by Tom Dillon.

The arrangement of the pioneer collection is almost complete and Curator George Barron announces that the room will be formally opened to the public on February first. An elaborate program is being arranged for the occasion by the Native Sons and the Native Daughters, the California Society of Pioneers and other patriotic organizations.

MARK OUT FRENCH AIR ROADS.
National League Members Plan Courses for Guiding Aviators.

Paris.—The National Aerial League authorized by the minister of public works, has commenced the work of marking out the air roads of France in accordance with the system drawn up by Rene Quinton. The first of these roads joins the great aerodromes of Saint-Syr, Buc, Villacoublay, Etampes, Vincennes, to the camps at Chalons and Verdun. Large guiding signs, visible from a considerable height have been established at all the principal points.

CARUSO CAPTURED BY HAMMERSTEIN
American Impresario Secures Famous Tenor for Summer Season in London.

London.—Oscar Hammerstein has captured Caruso for his summer grand opera season here. Information to this effect was given by Orville Harold, a tenor, who received a message from New York the day after Hammerstein left there on the Lusitania.

None of the opera officials here has heard anything, and it is said that Oscar made no announcement in New York. Harold says he got the information from Caruso's manager.
