## FINDS ROBBER MINE ON COLORADO RANCH

Mountain of Mineral Which, When Tested, Proves Non-Conductor of Electricity.

Grand Junction, Colo.--The rubber plantation boom is likely to burst with a sickening thud if the discovery made by T. E. Bailey, a ranchman near here, pans out as he expects. Bailey has discovered a mountain of what is believed to be mineral rubber on Parachute creek, near here. The mineral possesses all the qualities of the rubber and there is millions of tons of it.

Bailey at first thought he had found a vein of anthracite coal and later believed it to be gilsonite. He sent samples to Chicago chemists, who sent them back with the announcement that the mineral was unlike anything they had ever seen. The substance proved to have many of the qualities of ordinary hardened rubber and Bailey was advised that his find was worth thousands of dollars.

The rubber mountain is ten miles northwest of Grand Valley. The mineral is black and very hard and very dense. It is without grain or layer and is susceptible of a high polish. It

is a non-conductor of electricity and has other properties of hard rubber. It has much the appearance of the rubber used in combs and similar articles.

Bailey believes that the mineral can be utilized for any purposes for which hard rubber is now used. He says that he will place it on the market and if necessary, establish a plant for the manufacture of combs and similar articles. If this can be done, Bailey says, the rubber trust will retire from business without further delay.

## 40 YEARS--AND UNKISSED.

Never Had a Home and Was Not a Woman Hater.

South Bend, Ind.--John Eaman, who died recently, used to say that he had never been kissed by any woman other than his mother and sisters. He was a traveling salesman for Fuller & Fuller of Chicago, for over forty years, and at his death was reputed to be worth \$100,000.

He had no home, and was never known to have any personal belongings other than those worn on his person. He was counted close, though he occasionally gave liberally to church causes. He never accounted

for his eccentricity with regard to the sex.

He was not a woman hater, just wholly indifferent to women. While cold himself, however, he had an especial fondness for Byron and always carried with him a copy of the passionate poet's poems.

## THIS IS NOT A FREE COUNTRY.

Comment of a Foreigner Jailed for Spanking His Wife.

Hammond, Ind.--Charles Buluoli, 23 years old, spanked his sixteen-year-old wife with a strap and she caused his arrest.

Judge Frank Green, in the West Hammond court, told Buluoli that he had no right to beat his wife and sentenced him to 100 days in jail.

"You got what was coming to you," his wife told Charles as he left the courtroom and after he had told the judge he thought this was a free country and that he had a right to spank his wife.

## THAW SAYS HE IS SAFE.

New York.--In an interview published here Harry K. Thaw, for whose

release his mother and counsel are said to be making one more effort with hope of success, is quoted at length in emphatic defense of his sanity.

"I wouldn't harm Dr. Flint or anyone else if set free," the slayer of Stanford White is said to have exclaimed in reference to the State alienist who is opposed to Thaw's release.

Thaw says he expects his counsel will soon bring the case before a fair-minded jury.

## ICED IN SINCE CHRISTMAS. LIFE SAVERS REACH FOOD

Atlantic City, N. Y.--After being lasebound for a month on half rations members of the Federal life saving crew stationed at Little Beach, managed to make harbor here to obtain provisions. They had to break their way through ice most of the way, and the trip of less than twenty miles required over twenty-four hours.

The crew was used in on Christmas day, and since then has been cut off from the outside world. On Sunday night their food was about exhausted. Leaving the station with four men Capt. Bennett started at daylight. It required until nightfall to break through the ice to the outside channel. Axes and boat hooks were used. Several times members of the crew went through the rotting ice.

The men started on the return trip this afternoon to carry food to two left behind.

## UMATILLA SETTLERS FALSELY IMPRESSED

### NOTICE OF LAND REGISTER DOES NOT AFFECT GRADUATION

Notices Same As Most Recent One, Regarding Water Right Payments, Are Mailed Out Each Year--Other Project Payments Modified.

(Special Correspondence.)

Hermiston, Ore., Jan. 30.--Some of the settlers on the project have the idea that on account of the United States land commissioner having notified the La Grande land office to mail out statements of the amounts that were delinquent on this project, that the graduated payments on the water right were not to be given. The register is notified every year to mail out these statements and in case the graduation of the water right payment was allowed, these statements would be mailed just the same. Therefore, the mailing of these statements has nothing to do whatever with the graduation of the water right payments, as this graduation will come as a special order from the secretary of the interior if granted the settlers.

### Reclamation Report.

The reclamation report for January in the reclamation records are as follows: The river was low and all available flow was diverted into the feed canal. The maximum diversion was 136 second feet; the maximum delivery to reservoir, 115 second feet. Available storage in reservoir 18,500 acre feet. The "G" pipe line, 10,200 linear feet long was laid and partially back filled. Nine hundred linear feet of 12 inch, 2300 linear feet of 16 inch and 800 linear feet of 20 inch cement pipe was laid. A small amount of mortar lining was placed in motor laterals. Water right applications were made for 13,500 acres of land. Office studies and computations for the west extension were continued and a report on investigations was transmitted to the department on the 8th.

### Other Project Payments Graduated.

The services at the Baptist church are drawing large crowds of people. Sunday morning and evening Rev. Leonard gave two very fine sermons and several people came to the front. These services will be held the entire week.

### Revival Services Successful.

Public notices dated December 30, 1911, were issued for the Belle Fourche, Mindoka, and North project to take place of notices and orders heretofore issued for these projects and which provide for graduation of payments for these projects.

### MRS. SAGE HELPS ARMY.

New York.--Through the generosity of Mrs. Russell Sage, the Signal Corps of the National Guard here is to be equipped with a \$5,000 aeroplane and \$650 to cover the expense of its operation. The offer has been communicated by Governor Dix to the Signal Corps officers with a request for permission to accept it.

The aeroplane is one which was built at Mrs. Sage's expense in 1910 for Miss E. L. Todd, a woman aviator of the Garden City school. Officers of the Signal Corps will recommend that fifteen men be detailed for aeronautical practice.

The machine will be of great service for reconnoitering at the summer maneuvers in Pine Plains.

### UNION COUNTY PIONEER DEAD.

La Grande, Ore.--J. M. Smith of near Cove and John Murchinson, near Summerville, both pioneers of Union county, died last week. Mr. Smith came to Cove in 1892 and lived there up to his death from a paralytic stroke. Mr. Murchinson, who died at the age of 93, came to Oregon in 1863. He was a bachelor.
