### Cosy.

Military drama and four comedies for Monday and Tuesday:

"Cowgirls' Pranks." Bison. A comedy of the range, in which a bunch of girls steal the cowboys' clothes, and leave theirs for the punchers. The boys are obliged to wear the girls' outfits. What happened to the girls and boys in town

and on the road is the very limit for fun.

"A New Year's Gift." Itala. A clever trick comedy. The husband went out to get a present for the wife. What he got, the way he brought it home and its reception—its funny. And there was \$10,000 hidden in the box, which adds interest.

"The Legend of the Eagle." Eclair. A military drama of Napoleon taken in Austria. It tells of a soldier's disobedience, his repentance and the price he paid.

"Mutt and Jeff in Society." Nestor. Here they are again. You all know them and what they do in this one is comedy every second.

"Their afternoon Off." Nestor. A comedy of pretense. He was a coachman, she was a cook, they pretended to be millionaires. Both changed to meet later and the masks were off.

### "The Right of Way."

"The Right of Way" is a powerful, interest-stimulating drama, introducing rapid movement and acute situations amid a succession of pictures effects. It is the story of the degeneration of a man through drink and his regeneration through a life spent in the service of others, and particularly in the radiating glory of a pure woman's unselfish love that dispels the gloom that envelops a noble man's soul and saves him from himself.

Interest is principally centered in two strangely contrasting figures—Charley Steele, once a brilliant lawyer and Joe Portuguese, a man of nature in its most uncouth aspect. In the earlier scenes of this strong, pulsating play, the heartless cynicism of the jaded man of the world, Charley Steele, almost revolts one, just as much as one finds joy in the beauty of his real nature as shown by the change that comes after the accident that temporarily deprives him of his memory. The awakening of his love for the country maid Rosalie, instead of his wife whom he has found a frozen fact in his world, is exquisite in its simplicity, its sincerity and its truth, and affords one of the most pathetically sweet tales told on the stage.

The other chief character—Joe Portuguese, has, earlier in his life, killed a rival; has been tried and acquitted through the legal skill of Charley Steele, but deep down beneath the surface beats a heart, loyal, steadfast and unselfish. There is an intensely interesting love story running through the play which involves the girl, Rosalie, Charley Steele and his wife. Friday night, February 2, at the Oregon theatre.

### "LOCHINVAR" GOES HOME CHILD WIFE A WANDERER

William Berggren Obeys His Father's Command from Minneapolis "to Not Bother About" the Girl He Married. Chicago, Ill. — William Berggren, the 17-year-old "Lochinvar" who, with his 17-year-old wife, was arrested last Friday night in a rooming house on West Madison street, is on his way to a comfortable home in

Minneapolis, while his wife is still a wanderer in Chicago.

Berggren was sent to his home by his uncle, Charles Hyde, a drug clerk at Eighteenth street and Wabash avenue. "Uncle Charles," before providing the boy with railroad fare, wired his father. The reply, it is declared, was to send William home, but to not bother about his child wife.

It was said, however, that the young wife had arranged a meeting with "Uncle Charles." At the meeting Mr. Hyde, it is declared, will be prepared to offer her whatever assistance she requires. The father of the youthful husband is G. A. Berggren of Minneapolis.

The couple were arrested after they had quarreled in their room on Madison street. Their money was gone and this dispelled their dreams of romance. They were freed by the police after "Uncle Charles" appeared. Then they spent the greater part of a \$5 bill he gave them for supper at the College Inn. The girl wife will be sent back to her family, it is declared.

### HERMIT REFUSES MONEY BEQUEATHED BY MOTHER

Court Rules That Caliente Man Must Accept \$2800 He Will Not Take.

San Francisco.—At last a man has been discovered who cares absolutely nothing for money. That man is Eddie Weeks, 51 years old, a hermit of Caliente, who prefers to wash dishes for his food and live a life of seclusion in the wooded hills adjacent to Caliente rather than come to San Francisco and claim an estate of \$2800 bequeathed to him two years ago by his mother, Annie F. Weeks.

Mrs. Weeks, who was the wife of a sea captain, died two years ago in Lane hospital. She named her son as her only heir. As he did not come forward to claim the estate it went into the hands of the public administrator. Through letters found among Mrs. Week's effects the son was traced to Caliente. He paid no attention to letters.

Henry Dinkelspiel, attorney for the estate, and a representative of the public administrator's office were sent to Caliente to examine into Weeks' sanity. They declared him to be sane but were unanimous in the opinion that he was one of the strangest men they ever met.

He owned three cabins in the hills where he lived alone. He came to Caliente, which consists of a hotel and blacksmith shop, and washed dishes and sawed wood sufficient to obtain food and a few cast off clothes and then returned to his cabins. The proprietor of the hotel told the investigators that Weeks would go for six months at a time without speaking a word and that he had not been any further from his cabins than Caliente for fifteen years, and every time reference was made to San Francisco and his coming here to claim his estate he went into the brush and would not be seen for weeks.

Presiding Judge Thomas F. Graham of the superior court ordered that the estate be distributed to Weeks whether he wanted it or not.

### ABSTINANCE FROM TOBACCO NO CREDIT, LANDIS TELLS THIEF

Judge Declares Young Postal Clerk Had Better Smoke and Chew Than "Do What You Have Done," When Minister Pleads Leniency.

Chicago.—"Smoking and chewing tobacco is no discredit to a man. Abstinence from the use of tobacco, furthermore, is not to a person's credit." United States Judge K. M. Landis thus expressed his views in court to the Rev. W. H. Taylor, pastor of the Humboldt Park Baptist church, who appeared to plead for leniency for an erring postal employee.

Parker E. Abell pleaded guilty to rifling mail while in the employ of the postoffice as a sub-stamper.

"Your honor," said the minister, "Allow me to speak for this young man. He is a member of my church of good moral character and reputation unblemished. We were all much surprised to hear of this crime he has committed."

"What do you mean when you say good reputation and moral character?" queried the court.

"He doesn't smoke, chew or drink. He stands well with the congregation."

"Smoking or chewing tobacco or both is not to a person's discredit," replied the court. "I have come to this conclusion long ago. And if a person refrains from the use of tobacco it does not redound to his credit in my mind."

"You had better smoke," added the court to Abell. "Much better that you smoke than do what you have done."

The young postal employee presented an honorable discharge from the navy, received a short time previous to his employment as a postal clerk. He is 25 years old, married and has a little child, it was explained by the minister.

"I will continue your case," said the court after reading the honorable discharge from the navy. Abell lives at 1901 North Mozart street.
