KANSAS TOWN EATS 1000 RABBITS DAILY

Cottontails Sell for 15 Cents Each and Farmers' Boys Are Reaping Harvest in Winter.

Wichita, Kan.—Wichita people are eating more rabbits now than ever before in the history of the city. According to reports from butcher shops there are not less than 1000 rabbits eaten in Wichita every day.

The demand has been particularly brisk during the past week, and the butchers are unable to supply the demand, despite the fact that many hunters are in the fields since the recent snowfall.

Dealers in fresh meats grab up all the rabbits that are offered and are nearly always sold out before the afternoon buyers have finished buying their supper provisions. The rabbits sell for 15 cents each, regardless of size.

Lovers of rabbit meat claim that a

rabbit furnishes more and choicer meat for the money than any other animal on the market.

There are peculiarities of taste among the rabbit fanciers, according to the dealers. Cottontails sell more readily on the Wichita market than do the jack rabbits. There is more meat in a jack rabbit, but it is coarser in quality than the flesh of the cottontail and most Wichita housewives seem to prefer taking the smaller animal at the same price.

A great many Kansas rabbits are shipped to the eastern cities. The demand in the east is for jack rabbits. Dealers say that this is due to the fact that eastern consumers have not had their tastes educated to that point where they can appreciate the superior quality of the little bunnies. Some farmers in this vicinity have been taking advantage of the bad weather and the consequent lull in farm work and have gotten out their dogs and guns. As a result, many shipments of rabbits are being received from the small towns surrounding Wichita.

"OPTICIAN" WAS A BURGLAR

Drugged Woman While Testing Her Eyes and Then Looted Home.

Red Bank, N. J.—A stranger called at the home of Miss Jennie Joline, who lives on the Easttown boulevard near Red Bank for the purpose of looking over the house and property with a view of buying it. He was allowed to inspect the premises, and in the conversation that followed the visitor said he was an optician. Miss Joline, whose eyes troubled her, asked him to test her sight. He placed two pairs of glasses over her eyes, and after that she remembered nothing until she regained consciousness, about three hours later.

Miss Joline had her purse, containing \$13 with her when her eyes were being tested and the intruder not only took it, but money and a large quantity of silverware were also missing from the house. She is now confined to her bed under the care of a physician. She is in a critical condition. An investigation will be made to ascertain the drug used by the bogus optician.
