### DIVORCE FORCING SOCIAL TIES BACK TO STONE AGE

Professor F. G. Peabody Asserts Legal Separation is Becoming More Popular and Will Soon Break up More Homes Than Death.

Cambridge, Mass.—Divorce is making such inroads into the sanctity of the family that it is but the matter of a generation or two when as many homes will be broken up by divorce as by death itself, unless the present rate of divorce ceases, is the prediction of Professor Francis G. Peabody, professor of Christian morals at Harvard.

Professor Peabody declares that the home is a thing of the past; that the family has outgrown its usefulness, and that the social ties are going back to the stone age. These are in a nutshell some of the ideas that Professor Peabody has been trying to deal with.

"The coherence and permanence of family life are today seriously threatened. Domestic instability tends in a most startling manner to become an epidemic social disease. The number of divorces granted in this country is increasing. It may be computed that if the present rate of increase in population and in separation be maintained, the number of separations of marriage by death would at the end of the twentieth century be less than the number of separations by divorce.

"That means that about every other husband and wife will have to be credited with at least one divorce in a lifetime. Families do not hold together as well as they used to because there is less to hold them together. This break-up of the family system means what may be termed a reversion of type, a going back to conditions of primitive civilization from which the human race emerged."

### BELL BUZZARD BACK AGAIN.

Establishes a Winter Home on Roof of "Haunted House."

Dover, Del.—The "bell buzzard," which has been seen and heard in different localities in Kent county for the past eight or ten years, is now in Dover, making its resting place on the roof and chimney of the old Cowgill house, or "Haunted House." It can be seen every day, and the jingling of the bell on its neck attracts the attention of passers-by.

Evidently driven to town by the extreme cold weather and snow, buzzards are frequently seen in the back yards of the residences.

But a few days ago a buzzard landed among a flock of chickens at the home of L. Schabinger here, and remained with the chickens day and night until forced to fly away by one of the family.

Washington.—Officials of the Public Health and Marine Hospital Service are seeking legislative aid in their campaign against rabies, as a preventable disease. State Boards of Health have been solicited to make the disease reportable like any contagious disease.

That the maul is increasing in its prevalence, particularly in the West, is shown by statistical records kept by the service.

Until 1908, it is declared, there was not a case west of the Mississippi river, and last year from California alone 117 cases were reported.
