Constable Thought Child Was to Be Ruffed in Theater. Bellefontaine, Ohio.—"This infernal outrage has got to stop right here!" The village marshal of Dunkirk was speaking and his voice startled every person in the crowded theater. Everybody turned to listen and the manager of a repertory company playing at the theater, who was making an announcement from the stage, stopped talking.

"This is a Christian village," said the marshal, bursting forth again in torrents of pent-up wrath. I have heard of this white slave trafficking and as an officer of the law I am going to stop it being carried out here in Dunkirk. It is wrong to give a live baby away and a crime to put a baby up in a raffle," concluded the marshal.

The manager of the show had been making an announcement about the giving away of a white baby to the person holding the lucky ticket. The marshal ordered the show manager to accompany him.

The manager realized the humor of the situation and refused to go unless a warrant was produced. While the marshal had gone to get the warrant the drawing was finished. The

manager of the theater presented the holder of the lucky ticket with a white baby duck. A dentist's wife received the "baby."

MILLIONAIRE IN JAIL ON SIX-MONTHS' SENTENCE

S. C. Lillis, Banker, Convicted of Grabbing Public Lands.

San Francisco.—Rarely does a millionaire become a convict with the secrecy that has been managed in the case of S. C. Lillis, banker and one of the largest cattle owners in Fresno county, who has been in the Alameda county jail for three days, serving a six months' sentence imposed on him for land grabbing four years ago.

Lillis, who was formerly president of the Lemoore bank, was indicted on the charge of grabbing 32,760 acres of government land and was convicted by a jury in the federal court of Fresno in November, 1908. Federal men who attended the trial said that the testimony showed that he was one of the most flagrant land grabbers in California.

United States Attorney Lawler introduced evidence to show that Lillis had fifty men in his employ to make fraudulent entries so that he could acquire a vast acreage. The land

that he fenced in was in Fresno and Kings counties.

Lillis appealed the case to the United States supreme court, which recently affirmed the judgment. The action of the court was overlooked and Lillis surrendered himself quietly to United States Marshal J. P. Coyle of Fresno. Lillis was locked up in the Fresno jail for a day and a night and was then taken to the Alameda county jail.

PACKAGE IS DELAYED 2 YEARS

Lincoln Memorial Plate Is Held In Express Office.

Springfield, Ill.—A souvenir Lincoln plate presented by a Masonic chapter in Chicago to the custodian of the Lincoln monument reached the consignee after two years' delay in a local express office.

The delay was caused by a mistake in the directing of the package, which contained a china plate bearing the portrait of Abraham Lincoln and his famous letter of appreciation to the woman who lost five sons in the civil war.

The package was addressed to L. S. Johnson, when it should have been sent to E. S. Johnson. The local express office employees could not find any L. C. Johnson. Today the ex-

press agent, suspecting that it was really for E. S. Johnson, called the latter's attention to the matter. Soon as the gift was examined the custodian identified it as the gift sent to him from Chicago by Lincoln Chapter No. 177 Royal Arch Masons.

BRAVE IN A BAD CAUSE.

Woman Marches Innocent Man to Station—House on Theft Charge.

Philadelphia, Pa.—Mary Warden of Medford, N. J., demonstrated her ability to take care of herself by arresting William Graymiller.

She had accused the man of taking \$11 from her handbag, after which she seized him by the neck and his trousers and marched him to the Tenth and Buttonwood police station.

She kicked in the door of the station and shoved in her prisoner, made the charge against him and saw him locked up. Later Miss Warden appeared against him. When she started to demonstrate how Graymiller had taken the money from her bag a surprised look came over her face. She found the money still in the handbag. The prisoner was discharged.

U. OF O. STUDENTS MISS VACATION

NOT ABLE TO MAKE MIDWINTER VISITS HOME

Athena Youth Finds Place on Committee for Organization of Freshman Glee Club—First Aid to Injured Is Taught.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., Feb. 8.—Owing to the change in the college calendar by which the mid-year vacation has been eliminated, the Pendleton men attending the University will be unable to go home immediately after examination as has been their customary habit.

This change in the calendar was instituted this year by the faculty, the object being to shorten the entire period covered by the school year by abolishing the "week" vacation that has formerly preceded the beginning of the second semester.

The next vacation of any length will come in April, at which time all University students will have ample time to visit their respective homes, as a full week's vacation will take place.

Maurice Hill of Athena has been appointed on a committee to organize a freshman glee club at the university of Oregon. This glee club will participate in all the freshman social functions of the year. Hill is also on the committee that is to give the freshman dance on the 17th of February.

Among the latest features of the local Y. M. C. A. work, appears a series of lectures to be delivered by such prominent educators and lecturers as can be secured. Last night the second of the lectures was given by Dr. Comings on the subject of "The First Aid to the Injured."

In the course of his address Dr. Comings gave some good practical advice and suggested treatment by which ordinary emergencies could be dealt with. Using Chas. Koyle, secretary of the Y. M. C. A., as a subject, he showed his audience how easily an injured limb could be bandaged to prevent loss of blood or unusual pain.

These lectures are expected to be both instructive and entertaining.

A permanent organization has just been effected among the fraternities and clubs at the University of Oregon for the purpose of promoting intracollegiate athletics. For the past two years every effort has been made to induce men to participate in college sports, with the view of securing better support in collegiate athletics and developing otherwise unknown men.

The leaders, realizing that greater progress could be made by systematic cooperation, have organized the club league which is composed of representatives from all the college organizations, including the dormitories.

TIGHT SHOE COSTS

GIRL HER RIGHT LEG

First Irritation, Then Ulceration, Next Dilation and Last of All Amputation.

Baltimore.—Miss Josephine Patten about a month ago bought a pair of shoes which she wore for several days. Tightness caused a slight irritation on the little toe of the right foot. Miss Patten thought it would wear off in a few days, but it developed in several days in an ulceration. Next the foot began to swell and then the leg.

Thoroughly alarmed, Miss Patten applied for treatment at the Mercy hospital, where the case was diagnosed as gangrenous affection. The foot was opened and the wound sterilized, but it became more virulent, and the physicians decided that immediate amputation was imperative.

The leg was taken off just below the hip, care being taken to cut away all the infected parts to prevent the disease from spreading.

SHIPS NOT CHOSEN FOR AMERICAN TRIP

Big German Battleship Cruisers May Be Sent to This Country.

Berlin.—Plans for the visit of a German squadron to the United States are as yet incomplete. The admiralty will not select the vessels which are to take part in the visit until the diplomatic formalities have been concluded.

The battleship cruisers Von Der Tann and Moltke, the "show ships" of the navy, are available for the proposed visit, and the new battleship cruiser Goeben, if her trial trips are completed, probably will participate. It is hoped here that these three warships will be sent to America, as they constitute the acme of German design.
