

STOCK RECEIPTS HEAVY, PRICE FIRM

PORTLAND MARKET LAGS BEHIND SOUTH OMAHA

Shippers Do Better in Missouri Valley Than at Coast Markets—Cattle too Low—Hogs Plentiful—Sheep Offerings Liberal.

(From Monday's Journal.) There was no change in general livestock conditions at North Portland, although it was hard to get even selected steers above \$5.95 today.

There was a very liberal run for the day, with Montana sending forth liberal offerings. Today's run of 420 head compares with 395 head last Monday.

The great difference at present existing between the price of top steers at North Portland and those arriving at South Omaha is causing much comment among the trade.

South Omaha was paying \$7.70 for best steers this morning, while the low price for the day was far better than the best price here.

Heavy Showing of Hogs. There was an unusually heavy marketing of hogs at North Portland for the day, receipts totaling 1246 head, compared with 556 last Monday.

GROWERS BUY 300 BARRELS OF SPRAY Milton Union Holds Heated Session to Decide on Kind and Amount to Be Bought.

Milton, Ore.—The Fruit Growers' union held a meeting of all stockholders to decide on the kind of spray to buy for the trees and the amount to be purchased.

An auditing committee was appointed composed of E. J. Davis, A. W. Sommins, O. K. Goodman and W. W. Barnes. A dispute arose as to whether it was better to draw on the sinking fund to pay the rebate due the growers.

At the annual meeting January 1, the bookkeeper reported that such action was necessary and the directors ratified his report.

CALL FOR BIDS. Notice is hereby given that sealed bids will be received at the office of the recorder of the City of Pendleton, Oregon, for a fire alarm system in accordance with specifications now on file with said recorder; said system embraces, amongst other things, the following:

One two circuit automatic storage battery controlling switchboard of very latest modern improvement, made of the highest grade of material and workmanship.

One punching register. One six inch gong; also one circuit repeater for two circuits. Twenty non-interfering alarm boxes.

Also one 1000 pound bell-metal fire bell installed in city hall tower, and one automatic striking machine capable of bringing out the full tone of such bell.

Also one fire alarm whistle, dimensions eight inch, to have two-inch supply pipe and one air tank large enough to supply the whistle; also one automatic air pump to keep air in the tank at working pressure.

(The Common Council of the City of Pendleton aforesaid reserves the right to select the bell or the whistle above called for, at its option.) One motor generator set for charging batteries.

Bidders are to bid per mile on line construction installed complete, including all labor and material including that for fire alarm boxes; successful bidder to take in part payment material already in use in Pendleton not needed by the city in the new system.

All of the above apparatus and material must comply with the requirements of the Board of Fire Underwriters of the Pacific Coast; but nothing called for in the specifications which cover a patented article shall bar or prevent any one from bidding who can furnish apparatus that will perform the same functions equally well.

All bids must be addressed to the Mayor and Common Council of the City of Pendleton, Oregon, and must be filed on or before 5 o'clock P. M. on February 14, 1912, with the recorder of said city at his office; bids will be opened by the Common Council of the city at its regular meeting to be held February 14, 1912, in the council room at the City Hall of the city at 7:30 o'clock p. m.

A certified check of five per cent of the bid will be required to accompany each bid, check to be made payable to the Mayor of the City of Pendleton and drawn on some bank of Pendleton, Oregon, as evidence of good faith.
