ONE BREED OF COWS IN EACH SECTION

SUCH IS ADVISE GIVEN FARMERS AT STANFIELD

Railroad Officials Also Attend Short Course For Farmers and Schools Close in Order That Pupils Might Hear Lectures.

(Special Correspondence.)

Stanfield, Ore., Feb. 17.—There were two meetings of the Farmers' Institute course yesterday, which was opened at the old school house with a lecture by Dr. James Withycombe on the subject of "The cow," which contained much valuable advice on the selection and care of the cow. He urged his hearers to get together as a unit in the community and select the same breed of cows and gave a reason therefor, the fact that in disposing of surplus stock later on the ability of the community to deliver a car load of any one good variety would command better market openings with consequent favorable prices.

Prof. Ayres, also of the Agricultural College at Corvallis, followed with an interesting talk on the subject of "Good Roads."

At the evening session the large audience was favored with an extra lecture, the result of an unexpected visit to Stanfield, by C. L. Smith, agriculturist of the O.-W. R. & N. R. R. Co., who delivered a talk on the subject of "Home Making." F. W. Robinson, general freight agent of the same company also delivered a short address.

The evening program closed with an address on the subject of "Tree Planting" by Prof. R. W. Allen of the Hermiston experiment station.

Today's program includes a practical demonstration of correct pruning under the supervision of Mr. Allen, in one of the young orchards adjoining town; also a lecture by Prof. A. C. Boquet on "Vegetables." Prof. Kent will give an address on "Dairying"; and Prof. Dryden a lecture on "Poultry."
