

### LIVESTOCK MARKET STILL VERY FIRM

RECEIPTS ARE EXTREMELY LIGHT AT NORTH PORTLAND

Sheared Sheep Bring High Figure—Cattle Arrivals Few and Market Is Unchanged—Hog Prices Up—Wheat Depressed.

Hogs Continue Firm. Although killers are not inclined to follow the Omaha basis for hogs, the market here is really firm. Prices are the highest in the country, but the price of provisions is still higher. Counting the Missouri river market as a basis the price of swine here today should be \$7.25 or 50c above the present price. The price of provisions here is based upon the price in the east plus the freight charges. Were this not so, eastern packers would not be able to enter the local market at all. At the present time it is estimated that fully two thirds of the pork product used on the Pacific coast comes from east of the Rockies. The high price here allows eastern

packers to make their full Chicago profits on supplies.

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### BOY SCOUT A REAL HERO.

Burlington, N. J.—Life-saving work he had learned as a boy scout enabled Chester Buckley, 15 years old, to save the life of Samuel Probasco, a schoolmate, who skated into an air hole in a hockey game on Assisunk creek. Probasco had gone down for the second time and was carried under the ice by the swift current before Buckley, at the head of a "human chain," reached the opening.

Buckley could see the drowning boy under the ice, but could not reach him. He thrust his hockey stick under the ice, hooked the crotch around Probasco and, after several attempts, got him back to the opening. Grabbing the boy's collar he gave a sign to the others on the line and Probasco was quickly hauled out. Buckley then restored the nearly drowned boy by artificial respiration and he was hurried to the home of his father, S. R. Probasco, a prominent civil engineer. His complete recovery is expected.

Buckley is a son of Charles Buckley, an insurance superintendent, and is a member of the Fox Patrol, First Burlington Troop of Scouts. Others in the "human chain" were Norman Fenimore, William Thillingbust, Edgar Gallagher and John Martin.
