It was kept and fed at Spokane and then shipped to Tacoma, where it is being unloaded and fed today. The shipment will come forward to this city tomorrow morning.

Cattle Market Very Good.

There was a very good tone in the cattle market at North Portland for the day. Receipts were 268 head compared with 35 head at Thursday.

There were some excellent cows offering and top steers that came forward sold at top quotations in the yards.

Best cows sold at \$5.60 during the morning's trade and offerings were quickly picked up at that figure

whenever quality was available. Some slightly inferior stuff sold at \$5.50 and was quickly grabbed up.

No calves came forward and prices are nominally continued at the high range of yesterday.

For some days there has been a very good demand for cattle at North Portland. The market has been in excellent shape and whenever quality was available killers readily took hold even at advanced prices.

According to a prominent local killer, the price paid for cattle at Portland today is better than at any competing center. According to this authority cattle can almost be sent from the Omaha territory into this market and obtain favorable prices. Instead of the movement paying better toward the east. "Quality for quality and price for price," says this buyer, "we are paying more for cattle here than actual sales are shown at South Omaha."

There was a weaker tone abroad and lower quotations prevailed at all leading centers. The local crowd took its cue from the cables at the opening but there was a spurt of short covering soon after on the advice that cash wheat was in a better position at primary centers.

WENAHA RESERVE GRAZERS ORGANIZE

Walla Walla, Wash., Feb. 24.—Meeting in the office of Forest Supervisor Schmitz of the Wenaha forest reserve, in the Drumheller building yesterday, about 25 shepherds using the Wenaha reserve for summer grazing formed an association to succeed the tockman's alliance which was discontinued last fall, and which is to be known as the Washington and Wenaha Wool Growers' association. Most of the business taken up yesterday was in connection with the organization of the body, such as bylaws, purposes of the organization, election of officers, etc.

The object of the association is to keep shepherds in touch with each other and with the forestry officials, to the effect that the grazing on the various allotments will receive all the conservation possible.

R. A. Jackson of Dayton was elected president, and with the following board of advisors will handle the affairs of the association: C. A. Hales of Walla Walla county; Ben Dickinson, Columbia; J. O. Long, Garfield; R. A. Campbell, Asotin.

The association meets the second Monday in February hereafter.

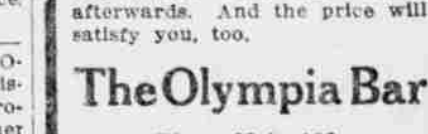

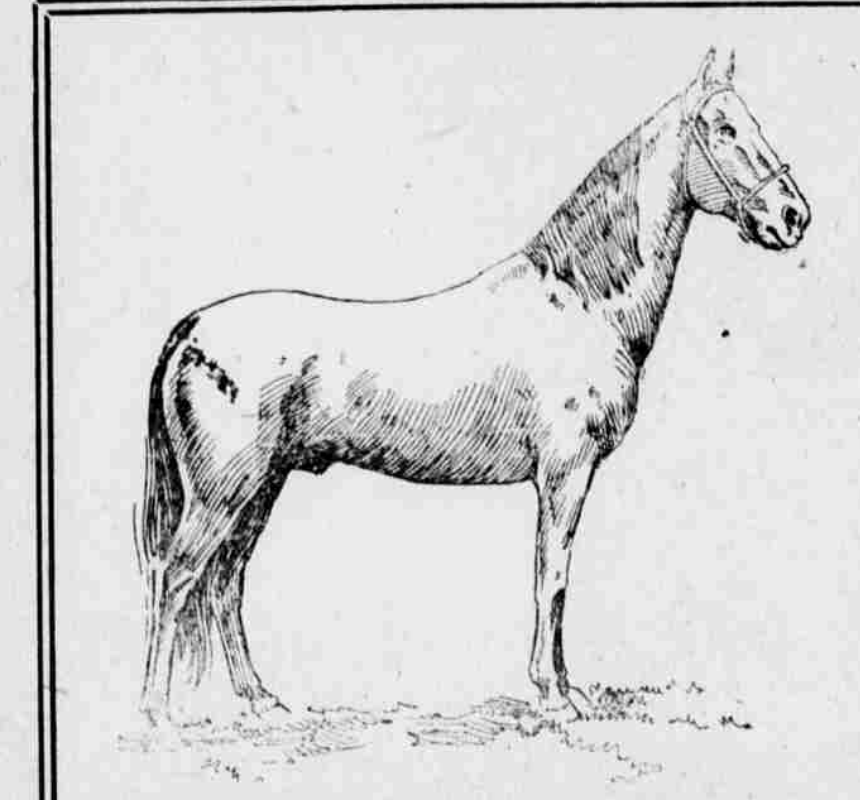
