SHEEP SITUATION VERY FAVORABLE

NO ARRIVALS AND HELD OVER STUFF IS SOLD

Considering Quality Prices Were Good—Small Run of Hogs and Pigs Stationary—Chicago Wheat is Better.

(From Tuesday's Journal.)

The situation in the sheep market is rather favorable at North Portland just now. There was no run for the day and some of the stuff that was not sold early yesterday was still available. This sold at good prices considering the quality.

Yearling wethers sold up to \$5.35 for wool offerings in the local market. This is a stiff advance over previous quotations and indicates the better demand for dressed mutton as well as for live offerings.

Two loads of yearlings sold at \$5.35, the average being \$7 pounds, while three loads sold at \$5.25, with an average of 77 pounds. In the ewe division the offerings did not bring above \$4 this morning, 44 head going at this figure, while two head sold at \$3.75. Best offerings of lambs did not bring more than \$4.70, but this was the fault of quality and not to any lack of call for a better grade of stuff. The fact that yearlings sold at \$5.35 proves this.

Hogs Hold Stationary.

There continues a firm tone in the hog trade for the day at North Portland. Local run was small and these were quickly picked up at former levels. During recent days the local swine trade has been supplied entirely with northwest offerings and killers have not been forced to go elsewhere for their needs.

Gradually the markets elsewhere are climbing up to the figures quoted at North Portland, the differential now being but 4c. At South Omaha best hogs were quoted at \$6.30 during the day. There was a run of 10-200 head there during the day, with prices 5c better than yesterday.

Provision prices here continue to be gauged by the price at Chicago, plus the freight charges but packers are not paying these figures for swine. On the basis of what eastern stock would cost to land here local hogs should be selling at \$7.40 today.


