### CONVERTED EX-CONVICT PREACHES TONIGHT

For fifteen years a convicted felon behind steel bars, "Billy" Eastman, the converted ex-convict, is now touring the country on a mission of reform and he will address an audience tonight at 8 o'clock in the Methodist church. With him is W. G. McLaren, superintendent of the Pacific Coast Rescue and Protective association, who has been in the work of uplift for many years.  
 Eastman has the distinction, undesirable though it may be, of having been the first prisoner sent to the Washington state penitentiary after it was established at Walla Walla, but his record as a convict is not confined to that prison. He has served terms in four other "pens," at Deer Lodge, Montana, at Carson City, Nevada, at Yuma, Arizona, and at McNeil Island, the federal prison in Washington. It was while at this last place that he was converted and during the last three years of his final term, he preached to his fellow convicts. He has been out a little more than a year and a half now and in that time he has converted hundreds of people to the ways of God and has been instrumental in saving many others from lives of crime.  
 Eastman and McLaren come here fresh from a crusade against vice in Huntington. Spending a week in that city dressed in rough laborer's clothes they mingled with the habitués of saloons and brothels of vice and secured direct evidence of the violation of the laws. As a result of their crusade, the saloons are now compelled to close on Sunday, the slot machines and gambling tables have been closed down and the many pros-

titutes who plied their trade openly have been driven from the city.  
 Eastman will be attired in his convict stripes tonight when he addresses the public and will tell something of his own fifteen years experience as a forger, yeggman and all around criminal.

### NO WONDER EGGS ARE HIGH.

**Farmer in New York State Feeds His Hens on Diamond Stick Pins.**  
 New York.—The high cost of eggs in Elmford, N. Y., was partly explained recently when a neighbor found one of George Fox's hens with a diamond stick pin in its beak.  
 Fox sells eggs to the Elmford corner grocery store, but it was never suspected that he fed diamonds to his hens to keep up the price of eggs.  
 When the neighbor returned the stickpin Fox explained that when he went out to feed the chickens in the morning he forgot to put the clasp on the pin and it no doubt fell in the yard. The hen, knowing a good thing tried to swallow it, but the point stuck in its throat.  
 Fox promised that eggs will drop in price.

### GOATS DO WELL IN BRUSH.

**Raisers Become so Numerous Angora Society May be Formed.**  
 Kilkittat, Wash.—Goat raising is growing in favor in the Kilkittat river country. Then years ago Rev. Mr. Hylton, who came from Virginia and located in a brushy section, procured Angora goats, which made it possible for the pioneer of the section soon to have neighbors.  
 The Hylton place, south of Appleton, is five miles northwest of this point. Hylton and his sons found the goats useful in other ways than as land cleaners. Mohair growing appears to them to give a sure return every year. Goat venison is said to excel that of the much-sought deer, often seen grazing with the Hylton goats. Goat meat is not so stringy and dry as deer, but has a tender and juicy flavor more palatable than mutton.

Today ten of Hylton's neighbors are engaged in goat growing and the industry is becoming more popular.

### LIES IN COFFIN HE MADE 20 YEARS AGO

#### Eccentric Genius Who Invented Many Articles Buried in Old Home.

Candalia, Mo.—Lying in the coffin he had made, the body of Colonel D. W. Hughes, a former citizen of Vandalla, Mo., was brought here from Ohio and laid to rest in the Vandalla cemetery.

Colonel Hughes, who was an eccentric man, 80 years old, built his coffin over twenty years ago, while in an undertaking business here, and kept it in his rooms until he left Vandalla, when his wife died a few years ago. The care of his coffin was then surrendered to W. S. Waters, a local furniture man and undertaker, and in his establishment had been kept.

On his visits back to Vandalla, Colonel Hughes looked after his coffin and amused himself by lying down in it many times. That the thought of it was not tinged with any horror is shown by the spirit he maintained while measuring his length in its depth. The coffin is a splendid piece of workmanship, and cost Colonel Hughes many months of labor. It is constructed of one and one-half inch walnut and oak, in combination. Along the center, midway between the top and bottom, is a hand coping of oak. A groove on the underside provides a grip for the hand. Around the casket, on the upper edge and inside, is fixed a light, hollow gum tube, and when the cover is placed and pressed down by drawn hooks, it is rendered airtight and waterproof. The casket weighs over 300 pounds.
