Husky Pair of Infants Emulate Brass Band in Good Working Order and Man Hangs Self to Escape Noise.

New York.—A pair of sleep-shattering twins is alleged to have furnished the motive for an attempt at suicide by Frederick Kalendousch, 28 years old, in his home at 213 West Twenty-Ninth street. He hanged himself to a gas fixture while his twins howled in a crib in another corner of the room. He was cut down by his wife and taken to Bellevue hospital. It is said he will recover.

It was during Kalendousch's absence from home that the twins arrived. They were two weeks old when he first was presented to them—a boy and a girl, Joseph and Mary. They were a husky pair then and grew huskier and of vaster lung power as time went by.

At first Kalendousch thought it was great to be the father of twins. None of his friends could boast of a pair and he was all swelled up about it for about a week. Then he began to lose sleep. When Mary wasn't at full bloom Joseph was, and when Joseph wasn't tearing off high notes Mary was ripping off that old gamut to smothered.

During the last five weeks Kalendousch has been figuring his sleep down to split seconds.

As Kalendousch was being borne on a stretcher to the ambulance he began to revive. He had partially recovered when he reached the hospital. He sat up a little and listened. No infant wall impinged his ear drums. "Thank God, they're asleep at last," he muttered, and dropped off into a deep, refreshing slumber.

Washington.—The busy beavers in the Yellowstone National Park have excited so much interest among tourists and nature students that the department of the interior has instructed the superintendent of that reservation to tap a number of animals and ship colonies to the Glacis, Sequoia, General Grant, Yosemite, Platt, Mount Rainier and Wind Cave national parks and to the Hot Springs reservation in Arkansas. As soon as additional funds are available colonies will be sent to the Crater Lake and Sully's Hill parks.

New York.—Michael Nathan, the United States customs department chief expert in matters pertaining to the fine arts, will resign from the service to accept employment as an art adviser to J. P. Morgan, according to a report.

Nathan at present is in London, where he is supervising on behalf of the government the appraisement and sealing of Morgan's art treasures which have been on exhibition for several years in the Victoria and Albert Museum, South Kensington.

Nathan first entered the customs service in this country in 1897, and has been in charge of the art division for several years.
