THE OUTLOOK OF AGRICULTURE

Address by Dr. James Withycombe Before the Agricultural Club at Corvallis.

The field of agriculture should appeal strongly to the young men because of its broad scope for applied science and its sure financial reward. Every student of the College of Agriculture should have an unquenchable ambition to own and operate a farm. Every student of agriculture may not have the means to own and operate a farm just as he would like, but as soon as practicable he should lay the foundation for his life's work upon the farm. This may be hard at first but with a close adherence to the true principles of modern farming, which means better stock, better seed selection, and better methods of soil conservation, success will surely come sooner or later.

Better farming is a national problem, the need of the hour is for trained men upon the farms to lead the way for a greater national agricultural development. For years an abnormal condition between our rural and urban population has been steadily developing until today we are almost confronted with a national crisis as to what to do with our excess of city and town population. It is estimated that within forty years we shall have a population of 200,000,000 of people. That means that practically every acre under cultivation today must produce double what it is doing at present, an imperative need of making two blades of grass grow where but one grew before. Thus the demand for agricultural products is assured.

Agriculture needs men for leadership in agricultural thought and activity, and it is expected that this college shall do its share in supplying this class of men for the farms of Oregon. The field for leadership is broad and open. We need men not only possessed with the art of making two blades of grass grow where but one grew before, but men with the ability to organize to prevent economic wastes. The matter of crop distribution presents one of the greatest agricultural problems of today. Note the waste annually occurring in our own state. It is estimated that the farms of Oregon produced last year commodities approximately valued at \$124,000,000. Fully one-half of this found its way to the channels of trade and fifty per cent of which was consumed in the cost of distribution. Or in other words, it cost the farmers \$31,000,000 to market \$62,000,000 worth of produce. This tremendous marginal difference between what the producer receives and what the consumer pays must be reduced. Conservative, intelligent agricultural organizations are the solution of this problem.

Agriculture for its highest achievement needs and must have cheaper money. The German farmers have perhaps worked out the best system for this purpose in what is known as the Raiffeisen system. Last year the farmers operating under this system did a business representing 1,634,368,989 dollars. It would be well if students in agriculture at this college would give thought to this form of organization with the hope that when they go out upon farms they may at least give intelligent assistance in the organization of similar systems, or modified forms of the same.

It is acknowledged in Germany that the Raiffeisen system of rural credit extension has lifted German agriculture from an impoverished peasant husbandry to an intelligent progressive and prosperous agriculture. The value of organization is in evidence through the work of the Grange. Practically every law, both state and national, for the betterment of agriculture secured its initial suggestion from the Grange. Since the Grange has been so phenomenally successful in elevating the social and intellectual standard of the farmer we should be encouraged that other organizations such as the Educational Co-operative Farmers' Union and Rural Credit Extension should work equally as well towards the financial interests of the farmer.

The outlook for agriculture is indeed flattering. Its greatest need as before stated, is for men of thought and action, men full of inspiration and love for rural life and with a desire and determination to help solve its various problems. Agriculture in Oregon is likened unto a vast grain field ready for the reapers. The outlook of the farm should be at least encouraging to this body of virile young men. The state and nation need you in the field of agriculture to help solve our greatest national problem.

TO INOCULATE SOIL.

Agricultural College Giving Free Bacteria to Farmers for Raising Legumes.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Ore.—Free bacteria for the raising of leguminous crops, such as alfalfa, peas, beans and clovers will be furnished to the farmers of Oregon upon request by the department of bacteriology at the Oregon agricultural college. The experiment stations experts have been busy preparing this material for the inoculation of soil for some time, and will send full directions for its use with each culture. Those desiring the material should send their requests at least two weeks in advance of the time they wish to use it, stating what leguminous crops they desire to raise, and how much land they intend to plant.

Any one who has examined the roots of a thrifty plant of this sort of crop knows that there are found on the roots small lumps, known as nodules. Scientific study has shown these to be caused by bacteria infecting the roots, and that unless these are present, a good stand will not be obtained, showing that the bacteria are necessary to the full growth of the plant. If the soil does not contain the bacteria, a good catch of the crop may not be expected. By using these cultures the proper bacteria may be introduced into the soil. Where a crop has never been grown on a particular piece of land, as where alfalfa is being introduced, or

when the stand obtained has not been satisfactory and it is known that the lack was not that of sufficient lime, such cultures can be used with good effect. They will not, however, correct lime deficiency, nor will the bacteria thrive in acid soil. For this reason, lime should be applied where needed before the culture is used.
