SON TAKES LONG TERM TO SAVE FATHER YEAR IN JAIL

Induces Court to Exchange Their Sentences So Parent Can Be Set Free Sooner.

Baltimore, Md.—Asking that a sentence of three years in jail imposed upon his father be imposed upon him and that his own sentence of two years in jail be reversed to his father, Hugh C. Lyons broke down in the criminal court and wept bitterly. Judge Elliott complied with the prisoner's unusual request and Lyons seemed much relieved when given the chance to exchange sentences with his father, giving the elder man the benefit of one year.

Though neither of them ever has directly admitted that they were father and son, Hugh D. Lyons, alias Philip Passavanti and Hugh C. Lyons, who bear a very marked resemblance to each other, have given the authorities much difficulty in proving their relationship. They were arrested some time ago by Detective Schanberger and Kahler on a charge of obtaining money through bogus checks passed upon tobaccoists and confectioners. Several days ago they were convicted.

Touched by the loyalty of his partner in crime, "Passavanti" asked that the original sentence be adhered to, but Judge Elliott carried out the reversal.

AN UNOFFICIAL SIGN LANGUAGE

If you were making a reconnaissance of a large area of greatly diversified country and were taking copious notes of the various natural characteristics observed as well as the many works of man, your notes would consist to a large extent of discussions of constantly recurring types which might well be expressed by symbols. The printed or written sign language is far older than the alphabet, and there is in common use today in the United States an official sign language which so far as geographic features are concerned is sufficient to describe fully, without the use of a single word, the most unusual area within the country or any of its outlying possessions. This is the collection of symbols and abbreviations adopted by the United States Geographical board and published, with their signification, on a large sheet by the United States Geological Survey. By the use of these symbols everything of the nature mentioned can be described by an amateur mapmaker, or can be read on any government map, and anyone who has the key to the symbols can read the map and learn the character of the area so far as the map depicts it.

Thus a rock in the ocean whose exact position is doubtful is represented by a simple sign the size of a pin head, and an oil well or a telegraph station is indicated by another symbol no larger. If a lake or pond is intermittently wet and dry it is represented by a symbol differently from that used for a regular lake, and if a section of country is covered with pines or other conifers the symbol employed to show these trees is slightly different from that used in indicating an oak forest. Some 70 symbols are used to portray the various works and structures erected by man, from suspension bridges to mine shafts or windmills; about 20 symbols are used to indicate different classes of land, ranging from sugarcane areas to cactus patches; aids to navigation and hydrographic features of all kinds are represented by many devices, and other general subjects covered are boundaries, marks and monuments and many special military features.

This sheet of conventional signs is much in use by schools and field organizations. It can be procured from the Director of the Geological Survey, Washington, D. C., for 10 cents or if purchased in lots of 50 or more for 6 cents which simply covers the cost of paper and printing.

AMUNDSEN CLAIMS HE AND NOT SCOTT DISCOVERED POLE

anyone else, that Scott reached the South Pole."

The foregoing dispatch, dated at Hobart, Tasmania, was received here today by the Reuter Agency and further complicates the situation in the alleged successful dash of Captain Scott, the English explorer, to the South Pole.

It is generally believed in London that Amundsen was responsible for the first dispatch, crediting Scott as the discoverer.

In reply to a dispatch sent for further details, a second dispatch was received stating that nothing had been heard from either Amundsen or Scott.

Christiania, Norway, March 8.

Haakon today sent a cablegram to Captain Amundsen, congratulating him on his discovery of the South Pole and granting the successful explorer permission to use the names of himself and Queen Maud in connection with the new lands discovered.

The nature of the land has not as yet been announced by Amundsen, but it has long been believed that it is rich in gold deposits and great interest is felt throughout Norway through this fact.

Today's session of parliament was devoted to glorifying the achievement of Amundsen in his discovery and congratulations were wired him.
