Major's Cat Story Goes Rounds.

Major Lee Moorhouse's story boosting for the establishment of a cat industry here is going the rounds of papers all over the United States. Recently it appeared in the Binghamton, New York, Press. It will be remembered that the major advocated the procuring of 1,000,000 cats and 1,000,000 rats in order to start the industry. Each cat he claims will average ten kittens a year and catskins will sell for an average of 30 cents each. The rats, he pointed out, will multiply four times as fast fed on the carcasses of the dead cats, so that the industry would be self-sustaining. Major Moorhouse figured that such an industry would produce a net profit of \$9800 a day.
