FOSS IN RICHESON'S PRISON.

Boston, Mass.—Governor Foss, accompanied by Lieut.-Gov. Luce and several present and past members of the executive council, visited the Charles Street jail where Clarence V. T. Richeson is confined, awaiting execution for the murder of Avis Linnell, his former girl sweetheart.

It was a regular visit of inspection. The governor did not see Richeson except at a distance as the prisoner was taking exercise in the corridor and expressed no desire to see him.

Others of the party, however, inspected Richeson's cell. The former minister appeared in a normal state of mind and health, though thin and somewhat pale. He had no complaint regarding his treatment and exchanged few words with the members of the party.

Counsel for Richeson has made no effort to obtain commutation, although the date of the execution is less than eleven weeks away.

Attorney Suppiger said his information was that Dahl may be insane.

Hahl asserted he thought Sunby was a coyote when he shot him.

MILD ALASKA WINTER IS NEARING ITS END

Overland Trails Will Soon Break Up and River Steamers Will Start.

Seattle.—The mild winter in Alaska is being followed by a warm spring and early destruction of the

trails, followed by early opening of the Yukon river, is promised.

The last men from Seattle who will reach Fairbanks overland will leave Seattle next Saturday on the steamship Northwestern for Cordova. From Cordova they will take the Copper River Railroad to Chitina and then the horse stage to Fairbanks.

Many of the passengers are Yukon steamer men who go to take charge of their vessels. The Chitina-Fairbanks trail is still in first-class condition and so is the trail from White Horse to Dawson.
