MARKET SHOWING SOME IMPROVEMENT

OUTSIDERS ENTER PORTLAND AND BOOST CATTLE PRICES

Advance Paid for Good Quality Animals—Better Quotations Forced in Mutton Division—Hogs Also Better—Wheat Up.

(From Monday's Journal.) The real reason for the quicker buying of cattle at North Portland today was the improved cal from the outside. Many out of town killers were in evidence and purchased liberally. The fractional advance in price is due entirely to the better quality.

A slight improvement was forced in sheep. Ewes sold as high as \$4.85 this morning.

A somewhat improved situation was shown in the hog trade at North

Portland today and an advance of 20c above previous quotations was forced. One sale was made at \$7.20 during the morning transactions.

There was a light run for the day, only 344 head appearing over Sunday, compared with the record run of 2663 last Monday. However the bulk of the supplies that came forward a week ago were for show purposes and did not enter the regular trade.

A further weakening is shown east of the Rockies today. The run there is abnormally heavy, due to the fact that but little stock was moved in that section during the past 10 days. For a while it is expected that the runs will show an increase over a year ago even though total supplies available are smaller.

Cattle Market is Steadier. Some increase in the strength of the cattle market was showing at North Portland today. Sales of good

stuff was made around \$6.50, which is considered slightly more favorable than last week.

There was a heavy run of cattle for the day, 13 loads being received from one point in Montana. There were also liberal offerings by eastern Oregon points.
